

Shoppers' Tastes Change Packaging Of Meat Products

More pre-packaged, trimmed, boneless meat cuts, both fresh and frozen, are expected to be available on Oregon markets to satisfy shoppers' tastes for convenience in meat preparation.

Oregon State college extension specialists call attention to trends in meat production and marketing that should gain popularity in the next couple of years.

Shoppers can look forward to many new meat items—prepared chicken patties, tenderized turkey steaks and more frozen prepared meat dishes. A few larger markets already are offering such conveniences as ready to eat beef that can be heated in a "boilable" bag. Families will enjoy more tender beef as new methods of aging meat are introduced.

Methods showing promise in research labs include injection of a tenderizer into the animal about half an hour before slaughter and accelerated aging at higher temperatures.

To satisfy consumer preferences for lean meats—pork, beef and lamb—producers are raising more meat type animals. Beef raisers, eyeing success of the switch from the fat type to meat type hog, are attempting to raise a beefier steer, a young meaty animal with less finish or exterior fat.

A third of the beef on Oregon markets grades "choice" and about 25 percent is "good" grade. Beef grades in the future will need to be adjusted to satisfy consumer preferences for a leaner beef, believe OSC specialists. Lamb grades were revised this spring to provide consumers with leaner lamb.

In the next few years, retailers will probably cater to a particular trade, say specialists. It will be quite common for the retailer to offer all pre-packaged

Irrigated Pasture Pest to Be Studied With Fund Aid

Research on a crop problem troubling Oregon farmers will be carried on again this year through a fellowship awarded by the George R. Hyslop foundation, according to a report of the foundation.

Richard H. Hart, graduate student in farm crops at Oregon State college, will receive the \$1,000 fellowship to carry on research aimed at controlling velvet grass in the state's irrigated pastures. Velvet grass is a serious problem in many irrigated pastures, said Dr. J. Ritchie Cowan, head of the OSC farm crops department and secretary of the foundation.

Velvet grass can now be controlled with chemical sprays, but this method is quite expensive. Hart will try use of fertilizers and controlled grazing to keep the weed in check. Value of the weed for grazing and how well livestock eat it, will also be investigated during the study.

The foundation fellowship plan was set up as a memorial to Professor George R. Hyslop, a former head of the OSC farm crops department. The memorial was created with gifts donated by friends of Professor Hyslop following his death in 1943.

The foundation is still receiving gifts from friends of Prof. Hyslop and from others interested in maintaining a high level of research on crop problems in the state, Cowan said. Donations are either added to the trust fund with the income used for graduate research projects, or donations can be made for specific research projects with both principal and income used to solve some farm crops problem.

cuts, fresh and frozen, which he will either package himself from wholesale cuts or buy pre-packaged. Shoppers who depend on the personal advice of the butcher in choosing a tasty roast will most likely rely on the store for uniform meat quality.

All these moves toward efficiency in production, processing and merchandising should be reflected in lower prices to consumers, believes Zelma Reigle, OSC food marketing specialist.

Streamlined meat cutting and packaging assembly lines lower labor costs which are expected to be reflected in lower retail prices.

Fun With Children Is Project Theme Of New 4-H Series

Pre-school children can be seen, heard and enjoyed in the theme of a new series of 4-H child development projects offered for the first time this fall by the Oregon State college extension service.

Boys and girls, 9 to 12 years of age, are invited to enroll in any of the three divisions of the new project "Fun With Children," now available through county extension offices. Nine and 10-year-olds, who enroll in the project, are asked to select a "fun friend," teach him finger plays and simple songs.

In the second year project, 10 and 11-year-olds, tutor their "fun friend" in more creative arts. They show him how to make and use finger paints, modeling dough and simple musical toys.

Twelve-year olds learn to appreciate individual differences among children as they observe them at play. In the third division of the project, "play experiences and toys," they play with pre-schoolers, make toys and watch youngsters play with them, study toy storage, and repair toys for a Sunday school or kindergarten class.

Oregon leads other states in approaching child development projects on an enjoyment of children basis, reports Lois Redman, state 4-H extension agent. Previous child development projects were centered mainly on baby-sitting.

Educators have found that the 9 to 12 age group are at a favorable stage of readiness to develop positive attitudes toward children, says Mrs. Frasier. At this age they are more sensitive to others and can learn to appreciate differences in behavior among youngsters. This appreciation for young children should help them become more understanding parents, she believes.
