City Librarian Lists Recent Additions Of Books Available to Nyssa Readers

Recent additions to Nyssa public library include a number of readable volumes, according to Librarian Joy Bell, who this week released the following list:

ADULT BOOKS

"Hunza Land" by Dr. Allen E. Banik. Art Linkletter sponsored Dr. Banik's trip to Hunza. These are the fabulous Hunzokuts, the people of the little-known, postage-stamp kingdom which lies high in the Himalaya mountains west of Pakistan. Men who live for 120 years and father children at the age of 90—women of 80 who look no older than our women of 40 years.

"The Strong Men" by John Brick. The suspense-packed story of the savage winter of 1777-78—the winter of Valley Forge.

"The Leopard" by Giuseppe di Lampedusa. This great historical novel, written by a Sicilian prince who died in 1957 thinking his work would never be published, has already been almost universally acknowledged as a masterpiece. Set in the vivid and austere grandeur of Sicily, "The Leopard" pictures a traditional way of life at the point of decline.

"In God We Trust" by Norman Cousins. This book is about the religious beliefs and personal philosophies of the small company of young men who founded the new nation that called itself the United States of America.

"A Separate Peace" by John Knowles. In 1942, America's first war year, most boys of 16 had only a little time left for the kind of life they had always known. Schools like Devon in New England might present an unchanging

face to the revolving seasons, but to the boys drawing closer and closer to war the atmosphere was heavy with a restless feeling of suspended animation.

"Blood on the Straw" by Berthe Grimault. Critics and reviewers in both France and England have marveled at the mystery of how so young a girl could write such a detailed and understanding account of the pathos and tragedy of human life. Simple, compact and direct, "Blood on the Straw" is in every respect a work of art.

"Alaska—the 49th State—in Pictures" by E. L. (Bob) Bartlett. The great land of Alaska, twice the size of Texas, extends both challenge and welcome to explorer, hunter, industrialist, miner, farmer, fisherman and sportsman.

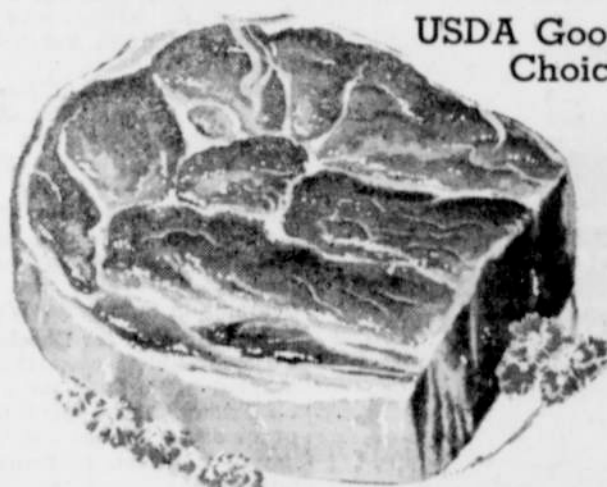
