Oregon Tax Take At All-Time High

Oregon tax collections reached a new high of \$208 million in 1960 according to preliminary data just released by the Bureau of Census. This compares to collections of \$177 million in 1959 and \$194 million in 1957, the previous high.

The 1960 tax collections on a per capita basis amounted to \$118.39. This compares to \$101.72 for the nation; \$162.82 for the state of Washington; \$136.99 for California and \$104.09 for Idaho.

Receipts from individual income taxes in 1960 totaled \$94.6 million or 45 percent of the total from all sources. Sales and gross receipt taxes (largely on motor fuels) brought in \$45 million. License tax collections accounted for \$40.8 million with licenses on motor vehicles bringing in the major part of the total.

Tax revenue of the 50 states totaled \$18 billion in the 1960 fiscal year ended June 30, it was reported this week by the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce. This sum was up 13.7 percent from the \$15.8 billion collected in 1959, and indicates that annual state tax revenue has more than doubled since 1951. State tax revenue per capita amounted to \$101.72 in fiscal 1960, compared with \$90.29 the previous year.

Protect Hunting Area; 'Keep Oregon Green'

With deer season opening this Saturday, Oct. 1, hunters are again cautioned to be very careful with their fires.

The local "Keep Oregon Green" committee, together with forest rangers are again sponsoring this program. They are reminding hunters that fires caused by carelessness can destroy hunting areas, kill off much wild game, destroy valuable timber and even cause loss of human lives.

They warn that while weeds, grass, brush and timber may be wet it takes only a few hours of sunshine to dry them out.

Other common sense rules are: (1) smoke only in safe places, then bury the cigarette in mineral soil, (2) avoid building camp and warming fires in unsafe places, (3) keep fires away from trees, stumps and downed timbers, (4) puddle the fire with water and put it out dead, and (5) warn other hunters if they violate any of the safety rules to avoid causing useless and destructive fires.
