Jess Mahan was born June 25, 1882, in Sneedville, Tenn., a son of Henry and Vesta Mahan. He was married to Mattie Drinnon in 1903 in Tennessee. She preceded him in death in 1946.

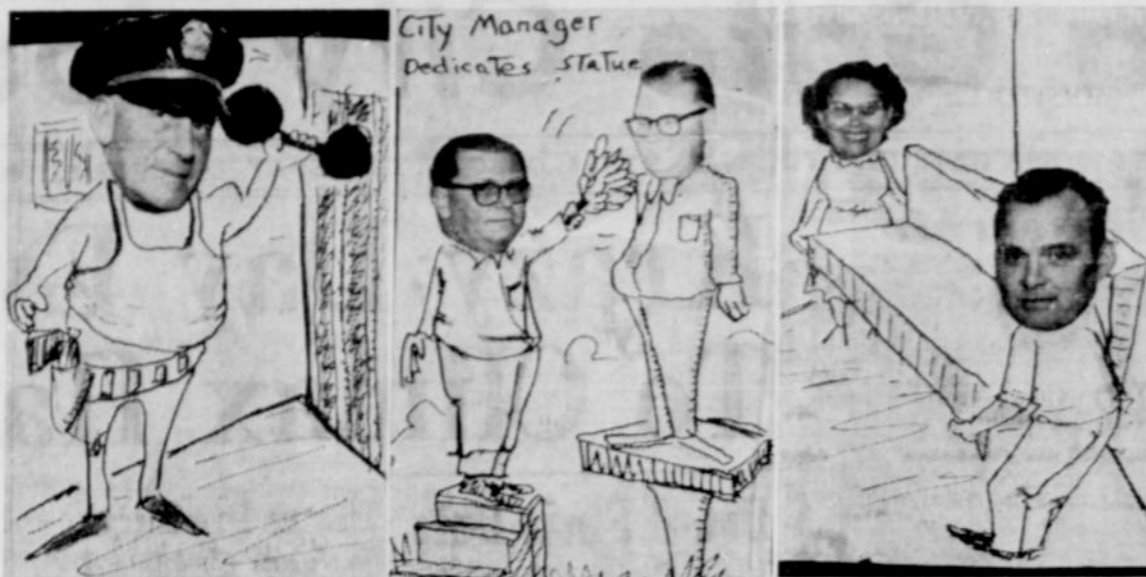

Party Honors Woodmans Following Anniversary Event at St. Paul's

Women of St. Paul's Episcopal church celebrated their 50th year of continuous service to the community on Sept. 25. The Sunday evening service began with evening prayer, followed by a dinner and party.

The church dates back to 1907 and was inspired by Mr. and Mrs. Josiah Boydell who came with their five children from the Province of Quebec, Canada, in 1904. The first confirmation class was held in the small community church in 1909 with the Rt. Rev. Robert L. Paddock officiating.

It was on Sept. 22, 1910, that the Ladies' guild was organized with Mmes. Boydell, G. B. Willis, F. A. Goeltz, F. Sexton, A. W. Ward, Sarah McConnell and the Misses Lotta Phillips, Eva Boydell, Josephine McConnell, Elizabeth Boydell and Ethelwyn Boydell as charter members. A constitution was adopted and members named the organization St. Paul's guild after Mrs. Boydell's home church.

Bishop Paddock consecrated the ground and laid the cornerstone in April, 1913. C. C. Forbes erected the parish house. It was the intention that a church building be added and this structure be used for social events. The original parish hall has been used by other churches, scouts, fraternal organizations, civic clubs, basketball, plays, library, art shows, fashion shows, square dancing, dancing school and kindergarten. Classes were held in the hall in 1934 when the school buildings were destroyed by fire.

In 1950 the interior of the hall was remodeled by men of the congregation and the building became a church instead of a parish house. In 1955 the need for more Sunday school rooms and other activities became necessary so a full basement was built and the building moved onto it.

In addition to regular programs, studies, missionary work and other activities of the guild, a united thank offering given by the women has swelled from \$2,188 in 1983 to \$3,869.985 in the 1958 triennial offering. From this fund churches, hospitals, schools and dormitories have been built and equipped, together with personnel training.

Special guests for this once-in-a-lifetime anniversary party were Mrs. Ruah Ward of Vale, Mrs. Britt Nedry of Boise, Miss Eva Boydell and Mrs. H. R. Sherwood of Nyssa. Others were Mrs. Evelyn Markle of Vale and Mr. and Mrs. Britt Nedry and children of

Payette. Corsages were given to the honored lady guests. A farewell party followed golden anniversary festivities. The party honored the Rev. and Mrs. William Woodman and family who will leave soon for La Grande. They were presented a gift from the congregation and a life-sized greeting card signed by all attending. A song honoring the Woodmans was written especially for the occasion.

The anniversary cake was cut and served by Mrs. Jake Fischer, president of Women of St. Paul's and Mrs. John Broad. Mrs. Maylin Maxfield was in charge of the greeting card and Mrs. William Schireman spoke on highlights of the founding of St. Paul's, the first guild and Sunday school, following their activities to the present time. Decorations were by Mrs. Royce Cole, Mrs. Maxfield, Mrs. Bernard Eastman, Vicki Maxfield, Cookie Cole, Jan and Triena Rinehart.

High school discussion club meets Wednesday night in the parish hall from 8 to 9 o'clock and is under the instruction of Father John Baumgartner.

Adult inquiry class is held on Tuesday nights from 8 to 9 o'clock and is open to any adult who wishes to learn about or review his knowledge of the Catholic religion from an authoritative source. This class is conducted by the pastor at the parish hall on Third and Park.

In Adrian, Catholic students receive released time for their religious classes and they are held in the former Holly theater on Mondays. Grade students meet from 2:45 to 3:35 p.m. and are taught by Mrs. Eugene Pratt, grades 1 and 2; Mrs. Willis Conant, grades 3 and 4; Mrs. John L. Thiel, grades 5 and 6; Mrs. Ray Barnes, grades 7 and 8.

High school students meet on Monday afternoon from 1:45 to 2:35 and their class is conducted by Father Baumgartner.

Approximately 200 students are under instruction.

Inquiry class is also held in Adrian Monday nights from 8 to 9 o'clock in the former Holly theater. All adults are welcome to attend.

MEETS AT WERNICK HOME

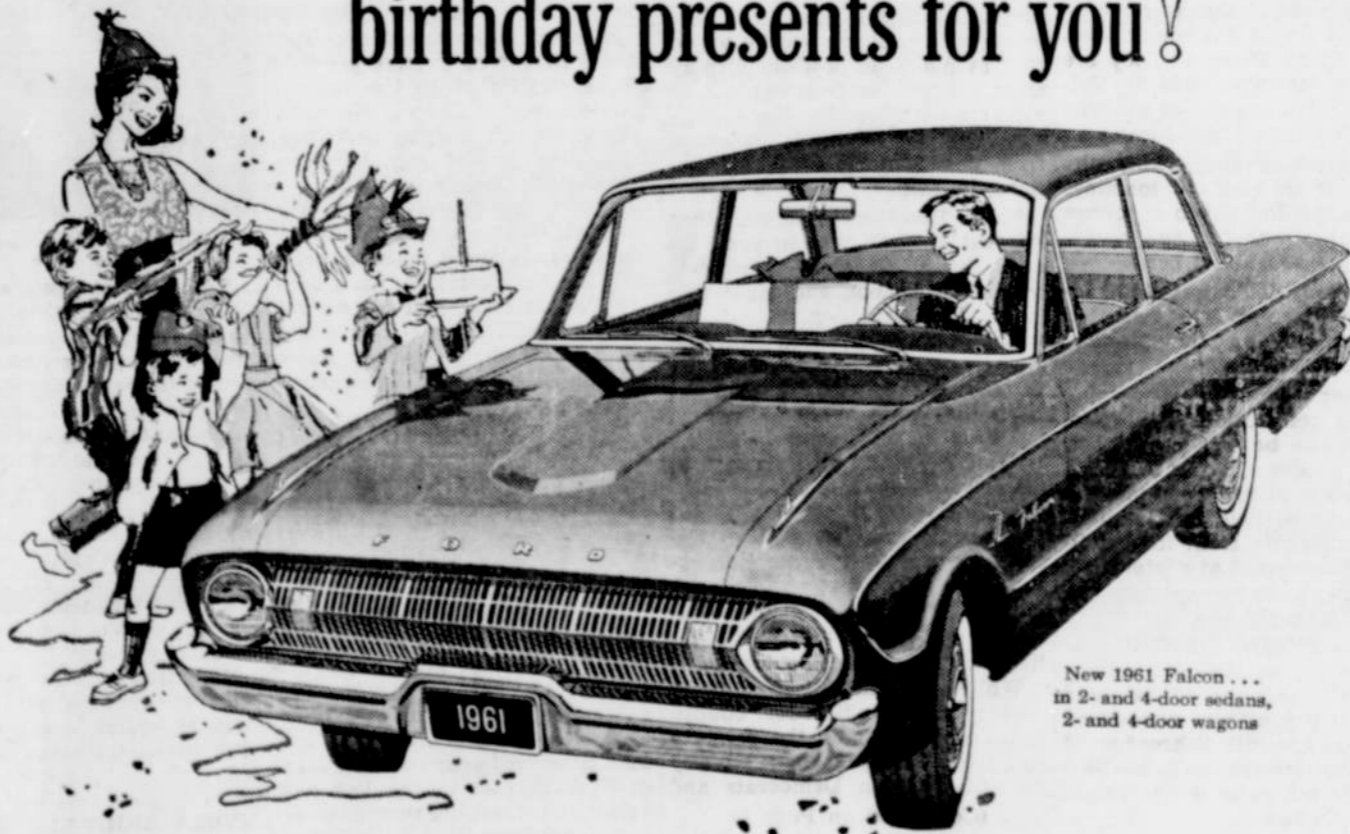
