

New Books on American Diplomacy Head List at Malheur County Library

New books going into circulation recently at Malheur county library include three volumes on American diplomatic subjects.

"American Diplomacy" by Robert H. Ferrill. A history which emphasizes the diplomacy of the 20th century.

"Diplomat" by Charles W. Thayer. How to get on a diplomatic list, why diplomats don't pay taxes, how treaties are drafted, what is an honorably spy, and many other phases of life inside the embassy today and in the past, during war and peace, are revealed in this study of everyone from the ambassador to the guard.

"What's Wrong With U.S. Foreign Policy" by C. L. Sulzberger. A book that contains a sharp, accurate portrait of John Foster Dulles, an analysis of our State department's overseas role, and specific examples of how foreign governments and people think and feel about America.

"When Your Husband Retires" by Mollie Hart. A sane and light-hearted guide on how to avoid the problems and win the awards of the years that lie ahead.

"Good Shooting!" by John W. Mackey. Tips on training your dog for shooting, how to hold and release birds and establish and operate your own shooting area.

"Mother Is Minnie" by Sophie Guggenheimer Untermyer. The memories of a New York City woman whose energy, good nature and ability to create chaos where order originally reigned have made her life and the lives of those around her a joyous confusion.

"The Seed" by Pierre Gascar. The story of a 10-year-old boy, deprived of his parents, who explores and discovers the tough factory town in which he has been sent to live. The author is one of the foremost writers of the postwar generation in France.

"The Wanton Boys" by Mark Oliver. A novel of a doomed youth and an Italy the tourist never sees.

"Dance Back the Buffalo" by Milton Lott. A novel about the Indians of South Dakota in the days just before a massacre which took place in 1899.

"The Sumatra" by Donald Moore. A story of Singapore, the white man's last outpost in Malaya.

"Juvenile Delinquency, Its Nature and Its Control" by Sophia M. Robinson. A thorough analysis of theories seeking to explain juvenile delinquency and of the research data that test them.

"The Teen-Age Years" by Arthur Roth. A medical guide for young people and their parents.

"The Cigarette Habit" by Arthur King. A scientific cure of the habit based on modern tested medical and psychological principles.

"The Year the World Went Mad" by Allen Churchill. An account in which the author surveys the U.S. social landscape of 1927.

"This Is the South," edited by Robert West Howard. Thirty-two authors, including the editor, contribute short articles to an informal history of the South.

"From Where the Sun Now Stands" by Will Henry. A novel based on the last of the great Indian wars, as told by a young Nez Perce warrior.

"Devils in Waiting" by Mary Motley. Comedy and tragedy mingle in this personal narrative of a young Englishwoman in an African jungle outpost where the dark world of the fetish was ever present.

"History of Baseball" by Allison Danzig. From the origins of baseball to today's headline-making games, the great teams, players, managers and games are detailed in a play-by-play panoramic story.

"Especially for Mother" by Vance Hyde. A collection of poetry and prose that captures the joys, sorrows and the hopes of motherhood.

"The Mills of Colne" by Robert Neill. A novel of England in the early days of the Chartist uprising.

"The Landscape of Dreams" by Teo Savory. The story of an unusual childhood.

"The Crime of Giovanni Venturi" by Howard Shaw. A tale of a Roman restaurateur's ingenious plot to outwit a competitor.

"The V.I.P." by Elleston Trevor. A novel of political intrigue, romance and adventure.

"The Book of Mary" by Henri Daniel-Rops. An eminent Catholic scholar examines the Virgin Mary as revealed in the Gospels, the Apocrypha, the early church and later Catholic dogma.

"Techniques for Efficient Remembering" by Donald A. Laird. Easy-to-use rules that can double your remembering of names, faces, numbers, lists and information of all kinds.

"Operators" by Frank Gibney. A shocking, superbly documented cross-section of the people, from fly-by-night frauds to community pillars, who, at incredible cost to all of us, thrive in the shady climate of gray-flannel morality.

"Wonderful World of the Automobile" by Ken W. Purdy. A wide-ranging miscellany devoted to various aspects of the automobile.

"Stranger to the Desert" by Dorothy Ross. The author tells of the experiences she and her husband shared in homesteading in New Mexico during the early 1900's.

"American Ballet" by Olga Maynard. Describes the beginnings of ballet in the U.S., present major American companies, five contemporary ballets and systems of teaching.

"The Tender Shoot" by Sidonie Colette. A collection of the French writer's short stories.

"Glass Slippers Always Pinch" by Nina Bowden. The story of an English orphan who was determined to be somebody, but after she married a handsome ineffectual young man of good family and seems to have her dreams within her grasp, she discovers she wants something sounder.

"The View From the Fortieth Floor" by Theodore H. White. A business novel, unlike many of its genre, pays more attention to the workaday world than to the private lives of its characters.

"Complete Child Care in Body and Mind" by I. Newton Kugelmann. A modern parents' guide to health growth and development of the newborn, the infant, the child and the adolescent.

"The Population Explosion and Christian Responsibility" by Richard M. Fagley. A full-length analysis, from a Protestant perspective, of one of the world's most neglected social problems.

"Houdini" by William Lindsay Gresham. A biography of the great magician which explains many of his techniques.

"Complete Book of Gymnastics" by Newton C. Loken. Instructions for men and women in calisthenics, tumbling, balancing, free exercise and other activities.

"The Go-Go Chicago White Sox" by Dave Condon. A chatty book that offers highlights in White Sox history, anecdotes about past and present stars, and a play-by-play account of the 1959 World Series.

"The Inspector" by Jan de Hartog. The story of a Dutch police inspector who, shortly after the end of World War II, risks a great deal to smuggle a dying Jewish girl into Palestine.

facing is needed, (4) plans should be made for future site developments, (5) any addition to the building would require additional site.

(6) window shades should replace the bamboo blinds, (7) better custodial service is needed, (8) each classroom needs a clock, (9) each classroom needs a filing case or a drawer of sufficient size and fittings in the teacher's desk, (10) teachers should consider the need for and use of inlay puzzles and work benches equipped with tools and lumber.

Under part two of the summary, recommendations were: (1) the principalship of two buildings leaves the principal little time for supervision, and the district should consider providing supervisory service, (2) use of hangers would help children take better care of their clothing, (3) more attention should be given to adjusting the seating to fit children.

Summary of the elementary school, other than covering the unsatisfactory items previously listed, were: (1) state cumulative records must be kept, (2) more up-to-date dictionaries are needed, (3) the library should be re-established at the earliest possible time, (4) many of the classrooms should be scheduled for redecoration next summer, (5) the glare from the gymnasium should be eliminated, (6) improvement in custodial service is needed.

Desirable items listed under the summary were: (1) acoustical tile on the ceilings would be a desirable addition, (2) give more attention to adjusting seating to meet children's posture needs, (3) seek more ways of completely utilizing the supervisory skill of the present principal.

In checking with Mrs. Clarice Poor, principal of the two schools, the Journal reporter learned that some of the recommendations were being done now but that others requiring additional funds would have to be started at a future date. She expressed her feeling that the most needed of all items now was surfacing of the playground for the children.

HARD WATER AFFECTS MINERALS TO VEGETABLES

Don't despise the calcium content of your water supply if you have a hard water problem. While hard water may make washing a problem, it may be a bonus as far as adding extra amounts of calcium to the diet.

Tests done on the calcium content of cooked vegetables showed a higher calcium content after cooking than in the raw stage. This was due to the high calcium content of the cooking water. Just goes to show that every cloud has a silver lining—even hard water.

Records are maintained by the association growers of cultural practices, kinds and amounts of fertilizer, time of application, timing and amount of water applied, weather conditions during the growing season, etc., to determine what factors contribute to the highest quality. Electronic moisture testers are used to determine the proper time to bale.

The tour is a part of an investigating study preliminary to establishing a hay marketing program in Oregon.

Alfalfa Hay Tested For Protein Content

Ten members from five county Farm Bureaus visited the operation of the Benton county Farm Bureau Hay association at Prosser, Wash., recently to observe and learn the methods used to test and price alfalfa on the basis of its protein content.

Officials of the hay association reported to the Oregon visitors that improved quality high protein hay has resulted in a premium price to producers and lower feed costs to dairymen purchasing the hay. Much has been learned from the three years the association has been operating, according to Karl Schmidt, association chairman, but much more information and research will be required to achieve the ultimate in good quality.

Hay is sampled and tested for protein by a commercial laboratory at Pasco, and a premium of \$1.50 per ton is added to the base price for each protein point above 15 percent. The base price at the farm is the Portland and Seattle wholesale price less freight. As an example, 20 percent protein hay would be priced \$7.50 above the base price.

Vic Smith, dairyman at Grandview, Wash., who has purchased tested hay for the past two years, told the Oregon visitors that high protein hay really pays off in the milk check. Protein in hay at the \$1.50 per ton per protein point is very economical compared to buying the same protein in grain, cottonseed meal, or in a commercial ration, according to Smith. He also said that knowledge of the protein content was valuable in developing a balanced ration.

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LABELING ACT IDENTIFIES HAZARDOUS SUBSTANCES

Cleaning products such as furniture polish, metal cleaners, bleaches and automatic dishwasher detergents which are poisonous will soon be labeled as hazardous.

In July President Eisenhower signed into law the Federal Hazardous Substances Labeling act. Written by the American Medical association, the law declares that any hazardous product not so labeled is "misbranded" and thus liable to seizure; the manufacturer can be fined \$3,000 and sent to prison for a year. The medical profession has tried for 25 years to get this law passed and a period of time will be required to clear retail stores of products with old labels.

Homemakers should carefully read labels and keep these products stored out of reach of children. The degree of toxicity usually depends on how much is eaten by the child. Most commonly used soaps and detergents are not harmful in small amounts.

Foggy Weather Driving Rules Told by Hansen

When you drive into a foggy stretch of the road, what are your chances of coming out alive on the other side of the haze?

Not too good, says Nyssa Chief of Police Lee Hansen, unless you follow the rules of foggy weather driving. He points out National Safety council figures indicating that in nearly one of six fatal accidents the driver's vision is obscured by fog or some other bad weather condition.

Hansen says the first rule of foggy weather driving is to slow down enough to be able to stop in time if something suddenly looms ahead. A well lighted car including headlights is essential, he advises. Even if the headlights don't seem to help illuminate the road ahead, the chief explains that they help oncoming cars to see you.

"Parking lights are for parking only," he says. "They just give a false sense of security if used instead of headlights for foggy weather driving."

Since foggy weather usually means wet weather, the chief suggests a checkup now on tires, brakes and windshield wipers to insure that they are in good working order.
