State Growth Faster Than Incorporations

According to a recent release by Oregon State Census board, 1,-756,366 persons reside in Oregon and 963,071 of these are within

incorporated towns and cities. There was an increase of 235,-025 for the past 10 years, or a 15.4 percent increase for the state but incorporations were growing

only at a 12.2 increase. This cannot be interpreted to mean that rural sections are growing faster than towns and cities but does mean that a large part of the increase is in outlying

sections adjoining them.

There are 220 incorporations within the state, with 10 of them having incorporated within the past 10 years. Of the 210 having record in 1950, 74 have shown a decrease in population. Of these, 53 towns are now shown as being under 1000 people.

Population of Malheur county is down from 1950 but Ontario and Nyssa show some growth while Vale and Jordan Valley show a decrease. Jordan Valley with 203 shows a decrease of 14 percent, Vale with 1488 shows a minus 2 percent, Ontario with 5,027 had a 12.6 increase and Nyssa's 2,594 is a 2.7 percent increase.

Western Oregon contains 85.8 percent of the total incorporated population of the state. Over half of these reside within the Portland, Oregon - Washington standard metropolitan area. Of the remaining 14.2 percent in eastern Oregon, approximately one-third are located in Klamath Falls, Pendleton and Bend.
