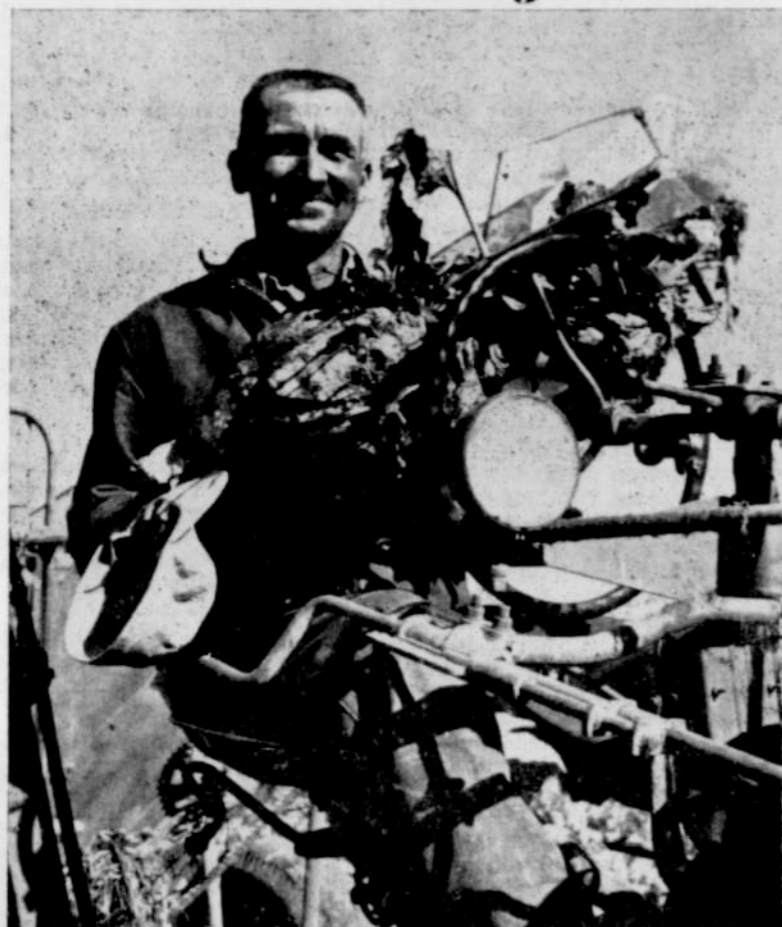

## U.S. Population Age Group Shifts Expected by 1980

Oregon and other parts of the country will need to mobilize resources to meet needs of more "youngsters and oldsters" in the next 20 years if present population trends continue.

Mrs. Roberta Frasier, Oregon State college extension family life specialist, reports that declining marriage rates over the past 14 years are expected to place a smaller portion of the total population in the 30-to-54 age bracket in 1980. This indicates that fewer jobholders may need to support more persons.

Marriage rates have more or less seasawed in the last 20 years and have decreased since 1946, says the specialist. In 1957, there were only about eight marriages for every 1000 persons, which compares with low marriage rates of the 1930's. In 1946 there were 16.4 marriages per 1000 persons.

Divorce rates increased in the six years between 1939 and 1946, then began to taper off, following the marriage rate. Number of divorces hinges in part on separation caused by war, employment of women and general prosperity, she said.

Most divorces occur in the early years of marriage, notes Mrs. Frasier. Nationwide two out of five, or 40 percent, of the divorces occur in the first four years of marriage. In Oregon 23 percent
