2. Many times the school can help by recognizing and helping to remove even one cause.

3. Frustration and anxiety always prevent good learning.

4. Many times children who demand a great deal of attention are showing us that some form of anxiety is present.

5. The school frequently puts parents on the defensive by continually telling them "what is wrong" when there are really many "right things" to be told also.

During the afternoon session Mrs. Rigney gave a demonstration of the Wechsler intelligence test and Dr. Warren led a discussion in which the test was evaluated on basis of its use in helping to determine a picture of the points during her lecture:

1. All behavior is caused, and there are often many causes.

Veterans' Home Loan Property Tax Shows Increase Over 1959

The average ex-GI with an Oregon veterans' farm and home loan paid a property tax of \$221 this year, as compared to \$194 last year and \$168 in 1958.

This figure was reported by Roy V. Bell, auditor for the state Department of Veterans' Affairs which paid the 1960-61 taxes in November on the properties of 20,236 World War II and Korean veterans who have state loans. The total amount paid in taxes this year was \$4,477,092, against \$3,626,343 a year ago.

In Malheur county, the tax on 217 properties amounted to \$43,192.42. The average tax here was \$199.04, compared to the statewide average of \$221.

The borrower pays his taxes monthly to the state veterans' department along with his loan repayment. The department in turn pays the tax collector and does it before Nov. 15 to earn the veteran a 3 percent discount. The discount this year saved the veterans \$138,467.
