FUNERAL SERVICES CONDUCTED SATURDAY FOR MRS. ISA B. GALL

Funeral services for Isa B. Gall were held Saturday afternoon, Jan. 14, 1961, at Lienkaemper chapel with the Rev. Paul Ludlow of Nyssa Methodist church officiating. Soloist June Marie Wyckoff sang two of Mrs. Gall's favorite hymns, "Bringing in the Sheaves" and "Rock of Ages."

Mrs. Gall was born Jan. 30, 1880, in Adams county, Ohio. She was one of 11 children born to John and Lydia Reddick. She succumbed Jan. 12, 1961, in Nyssa following a lingering illness.

She was baptized and united with the Methodist church in early childhood in Sinking Springs, Ohio. She also attended school there. She had been a member of the Nyssa Methodist church since 1955.

On Feb. 2, 1904, she was married to T. A. Gall in Hillsboro, Ohio. The family came west in 1913 to Sidney, Mont., where they purchased a cattle ranch. They resided there until 1938 when they moved to Creston, Mont., and farmed until retirement in 1944. In 1947 the Galls moved to Notus, Idaho, and remained until 1949 when they came to Nyssa.

Mrs. Gall was a devout Christian and a good homemaker. She was fond of flowers and always had many around her. She spent a lot of time in her kitchen as she was also fond of cooking. Ill health had limited her activities for the past seven years.

In addition to Mr. Gall survivors include one son, Lionel Gall of Sidney; two daughters, Helen Chadderdon of Nyssa and Bonnie Bright of Joseph, Ore.

Also surviving are one brother, Roy Reddick of Sidney; a sister, Effie Hochwalt of Dayton, Ohio, and seven grandchildren.

Interment was made in the Nyssa cemetery under direction of Lienkaemper funeral home. Pallbearers were Everett and Robert Heldt, John Dority, Fred Bennett, Bernard Eastman and Bob Wilson.

DO YOU KNOW?

By Mrs. J. W. Rigney That there is a Juvenile Court advisory council in Malheur county? That this council consists of seven directors, all of whom were appointed by the Malheur county court?

That the appointment of such a council is provided for by Oregon law? That the Malheur county council provides representation from Nyssa, Adrian, Ontario and Vale areas?

That this council has been holding regular monthly meetings since July 7, 1960? That the purpose of this council as provided by law is as follows:

a. To study and make recommendations concerning the operation of the juvenile court, including counselors and other personnel, detention facilities, shelter care, foster homes and other facilities functioning or needed in connection therewith.

b. To study and make recommendations in connection with community programs and services designed to prevent or correct juvenile delinquency and other children's problems of the type coming before the juvenile court.

c. To take appropriate action to stimulate community interest in the problems of children and to carry out the recommendations of the council.
