Rep. Stunz Outlines Governor's Program

(Continued from Page 1)

Problems result from the inability of young people to find work during the summer months and the employment thus provided would be non-hazardous and would consist of pruning and thinning young trees, working to control tree diseases in the forests, building trails, cleaning streams, etc.

Outlines Governor's Desires

Most of you have by this time read elsewhere the highlights of Gov. Mark Hatfield's message to the legislature but for those who haven't, I will briefly outline what he has set forth for us to work on during this session.

Taxation—Replace inventory tax with net business income tax. Widen tax base by adopting net receipts tax.

Social Legislation—Establish medicare for aged. Establish community health clinics. Allow employers to provide self-insurance through Industrial Accident commission.

Regulation—Require bars to get a specific minimum of their gross income from food. Give cities more liquor money. Set a maximum speed limit and implied consent for intoxication tests.

Education—Increase the basic school support.

Reorganization—Approve cabinet system of government.

A lot of bills have been introduced relative to the governor's program, as outlined above, and it looks like there will be plenty of work for the various committees from now on.

State Scholarship Applications Due

"Seniors who wish to apply for state scholarships should pick up and complete their applications before Feb. 17," reports Lawrence Schwarz.

Applications are available at the office. If you've ever wondered why there is a set deadline, Schwarz has the answer. Mrs. Effie Ellen Smith has to get the applicant's grades for their first 3½ years in high school, the applications, the student's financial statement and recommendations in to state officials before March 1.
