

Funeral Services Scheduled Tomorrow For Wayne English

Funeral services for Darrell Wayne English, Jr., will be held at 2:30 p.m. tomorrow, Jan. 20, at St. Mary's Memorial Presbyterian church in Roswell. The Rev. Richard Mastbrook will officiate.

Darrell Wayne was born Feb. 29, 1952, in Caldwell, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Darrell W. English. He succumbed at the age of 8 years, 10 months and 19 days, early Tuesday morning, Jan. 17, 1961, at his Ontario home, following a long illness.

The family lived in Parma until last July, when they moved to Ontario. He had attended Aiken grade school in Ontario last fall and was active in Cub Scouting until the time of his death.

He had been active in the Roswell church Sunday school until the family moved from the community.

In addition to his parents, survivors include a brother, Ross, and one sister, Eleanor, both of the home.

Also surviving are his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Earl Clary of Parma and Mrs. Dora English of Nampa.

Interment will be made at Roswell under direction of Peckham-Dakan-Davis chapel.

American Legion Post Holds Military Rites For Frank Rambaud

Final rites for Louis Frank Rambaud were held Monday afternoon, Jan. 16, 1961, at Lienkaemper chapel, with the Rev. John Briehl of Faith Lutheran church officiating. He succumbed Jan. 13, 1961, in the Veterans' hospital in Boise following two months' illness.

Mr. Rambaud was born July 20, 1910, in Boise, Idaho, a son of Pete and Cinda Rambaud.

At the age of six years he came with his family to Nyssa. He started to work for the Bureau of Reclamation in October 1942 and continued there until September 1943, when he went to the army. He returned to the bureau in May 1946 and was transferred with other personnel to the North Board of Control, which replaced the bureau in Jan. 1952. On Jan. 7, 1957, he resigned his position with the Ace Pastime. He was owner and operator of the tavern at the time of his death.

He was married in December 1948 to Clara Settles.

Mr. Rambaud was a World War II veteran, a member of Eagles lodge and American Legion. He was fond of sports and area residents will remember him for his baseball pitching.

Survivors include his widow, Clara; one son, Frankie; four step-children, Jimmy Settles with the U.S. Navy in Norfolk, Va., Richard Settles of Nyssa; Helen Kelch of Reno, Nev.; and Dorothy Parker of Nyssa.

Other survivors include a sister, Mrs. Ruby Ford of San Carlos, Calif., and an aunt, Louise Rambaud of France.

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Oregon Veterans' Loan Funds Deemed Ample for 1961 Needs

Oregon veterans' farm and home loans were granted to 2185 veterans last year in the amount of \$22,969,150. H. C. Saalfeld, director of the state Department of Veterans' Affairs, reported recently. This was less than half the volume of the 1959 record year, when 5170 veterans borrowed \$52,932,550. The drop was due to the department's lack of authority to issue bonds to obtain adequate loan funds.

But this year should set a new record of about \$60 millions in loan, Saalfeld said, because passage of the war veterans' bonding and loan amendment in the recent general election assures ample funds in 1961 to meet the continuing high demand for loans.

The first \$30,000,000 in self-liquidating bonds from this new bond authorization went on sale Jan. 17. When the funds are received a month later, the department will immediately start closing loans in its backlog, which on Dec. 31 amounted to 1887. Proceeds from this sale—along with unused loan receipts—are expected to last until July, when another bond sale will be scheduled, according to Saalfeld.

A breakdown by counties shows that in Malheur county last year, 23 veterans borrowed \$249,300. This year, if the predicted volume of \$60 millions hold true, veterans in this county should receive loans in the amount of about \$684,000, based on the volume of state loans here since 1945.

In the 15 years of the program, the department has granted 31,456 loans amounting to \$231,634,374. Of this number, 20,417 loans were outstanding on Dec. 31 in the amount of \$157,498,439.

is needed. In Malheur county the Public Health department is called upon to do this, but it is sometimes difficult with limited personnel. The local health department should be kept informed of all private patients who are being treated, resist or lapse in treatment, or who are receiving preventive treatment.

Public support should be given to legislation now pending to have the state assume the full cost of care of patients in the TB hospital. Since TB is a contagious disease, isolation is important. Patients resist it when it means the loss of all their assets in order to pay the cost of their care.

Also reported at the meeting was the total of the Christmas Seal campaign to date. This is \$4360.60, which is about \$1000 below last year's totals. Reminders were put into the mail last week. It is hoped that the need for contributions is shown by Mrs. Blaylock's report.

High School Senior Weekend Scheduled Jan. 28-29 at OSC
