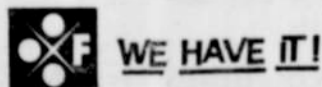
Mrs. Russell Cochran was hostess to seven members of the Marlene Harmon circle. Mrs. Paul Ludlow led devotions and the program.

Mrs. Freel was born Edith So-phia Doty, a daughter of Henry and Elizabeth Doty, on Dec. 10, 1891, in Portland. She succumbed Jan. 18, 1961, at her home in Adrian following a lingering illness.

She was married to Frank A. Freel on Dec. 11, 1911, in Cherry county, Neb. Mr. Freel preceded her in death on July 2, 1957. They lived in Cody, Neb., before coming to the Adrian area in 1928.
