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\$5,000 on the personal residence of taxpayers over 65 years of age if the taxpayer has lived in Oregon continuously for five years and has a taxable income of less than \$6,000 in the year in question.

Measure Seeks Cigarette Tax

(4) A measure setting a cigarette tax at 3 cents per package is proposed. It is estimated that this will produce \$5,000,000 in the fiscal year 1961-62. (5) My committee on highways has introduced bills providing for chemical tests in the event of arrest for drunken driving. It also contains a revocation of driver's license if the person arrested refuses to submit to a chemical test to determine the alcohol content in the blood.

(6) Another bill from our committee would establish a speed limit of 70 miles per hour on freeways with a limit on other highways to be fixed by the State Speed Control board. I will submit information on the bills before us in this column from time to time.

Cascade Expands, Adds New System

Public Utility Commissioner Jonel C. Hill recently authorized Cascade Natural Gas corporation of Seattle to issue a secured installment promissory note in the amount of \$1,200,000 as payment for the Moses Lake municipal gas distribution system.

Acquisition of the Central Washington system will strengthen the firm's position in this area by allowing it to expand service to large industrial customers outside the city limits of Moses Lake and into Larson Air Force base and the community of Quincy, Hill said.

Hill pointed out that approximately 23 percent of Cascade's operating revenues were derived from Oregon customers in the Pendleton, Bend, Baker, Athena-Weston, Ontario, Hermiston, Milton-Freewater and Nyssa areas.

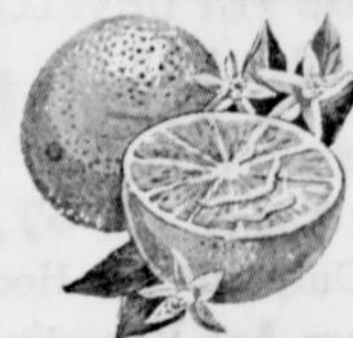
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
