and then a merchant would shout something in Arabic which I didn't yet understand or a donkey would let out a bray that would pierce the constant hum of the chattering crowd.

We edged our way through the narrow streets which were lined on each side by open-air stalls that contained home grown produce, fish, freshly slaughtered meat, cloth, etc. And now and then the smell of greasy meat being fried in a big pot of olive oil would fill my nostrils. Blond hair and blue eyes immediately identified me as a tourist which turned out to be a big disadvantage on my part. Some shop keepers would follow me several blocks before giving up the idea of getting me into their shops to buy something.

To avoid the mass confusion of the crowd, we took a side street. This narrow pathway led us through the street known as the "Way of the Cross" (John 19:5). It was through this street that Christ drew the cross to the place of His crucifixion. Over this place now stands the Church of the Holy Sepulchre, constructed in 335 A.D.

As the day drew to a close, we climbed aboard a rickety old bus and started off for Jericho. And as we rode down the winding road, I couldn't help but think that in so many ways this country is not much different now than in the time of Christ. And it is understanding these differences in culture that is the real challenge in the IFYE program.
