First National Bank Deposits Near Billion: Decrease in Nyssa

For the third successive year First National Bank of Oregon has recorded new all-time record high deposits, it was revealed when the Dec. 31, 1960, statement of condition figures were reported to the comptroller of the currency.

Year-end deposits of \$880,339,688 were reported, topping the record of \$878,642,322 set one year before. The Dec. 31, 1958, record high was \$849,167,094.

Loans for the 84 offices amounted to \$503,484,790, an increase of \$14,526,683 compared to the 1959 year-end figure, but a decrease of \$6,769,415 since the Oct. 10 call figure when a record high \$510,274,206 was reported.

The Nyssa branch of First National reported year-end deposits of \$5,044,733 and loans totaling \$3,904,932, according to Leonard Hewett, branch manager.

At the same time he released comparable totals for the branch for Dec. 31, 1959. On that date deposits were \$5,268,895 and loans were \$3,432,095.

Ralph J. Voss, president of First National, indicated that although there was a substantial increase in the number of accounts, the volume of banking activity and the use of bank services at First National during the past year, the "tight money" situation had its effect on balances, keeping the dollar amount down to some degree.

Four Nyssans Face Charges of Assault

Four Nyssans were arraigned in Justice court Monday on charges of assault with a dangerous weapon following two separate fights originating at Nyssa tavern.

Brothers Richard and Ernesto Apodaca waived preliminary hearing and were bound over to Malheur county grand jury. They were held in the county jail in lieu of \$500 bail each.

They were arrested following a fight Saturday night. The pair was charged with beating and kicking Joe Madrid. The latter was taken to Malheur Memorial hospital where he received treatment.

Madrid and his son Louis were also charged with assault with a dangerous weapon. A complaint signed by Roberto Apodaca, father of the brothers, accused the Madrids of assaulting, beating and kicking him in another fight Jan. 23.

The Madrids have requested a preliminary hearing but are being held in county jail in lieu of \$500 bail each.

Administration Asks For Simple Extension Of U.S. Sugar Act

The Kennedy administration asked Congress Tuesday for a simple extension of the U.S. Sugar act to Dec. 31, 1962. It also requested that the Dominican Republic be cut out of any special benefits from the present U.S. ban on buying sugar from Cuba.

The present act, under which foreign and domestic marketing quotas are fixed, expires next March 31.

An extension of the present act would mean that Congress would not now undertake a general revision of the sugar law, nor consider requests from many nations and domestic areas for increases in quotas or new quotas for nations not now entitled to sell sugar in the United States.

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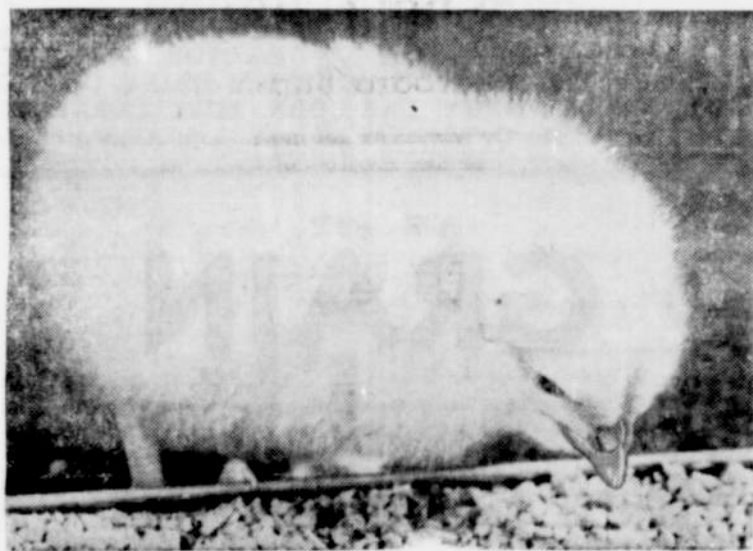
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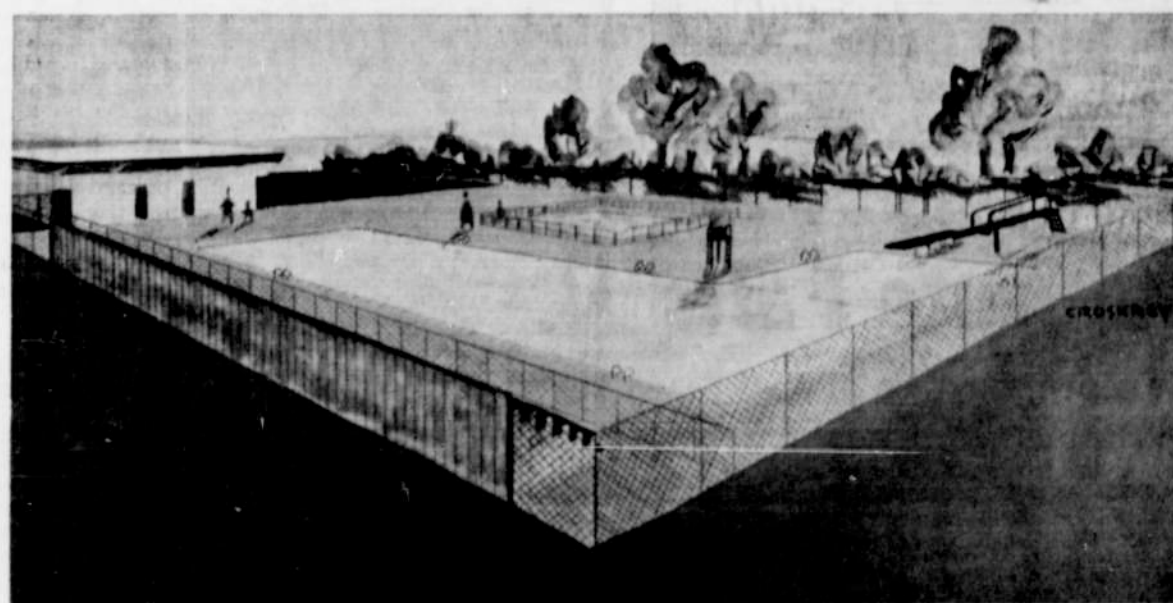
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
