Rep. Emil Stunz Reports Final Action Due April 14 on Lake Owyhee Road

Senator Anthony Yturri and I met with W. C. (Dutch) Williams, state highway engineer, and Mark Astrup, state park director, relative to securing funds to be used for completion of the Lake Owyhee road.

They took the matter up at the State Highway commission meeting here March 10, and today (March 13) Mr. Astrup informed me that a cost study will be made of the project which they hope to have completed and ready for final action by the commission when members meet again April 14.

The parks director commented, "Prospects of the highway commission taking over the Owyhee lake road look very favorable."

The Oregon legislature has now been in session 63 days. More than 1300 bills have been introduced and 70 of these have been sent to the governor for his signature. It has been predicted that we may be through here in five or six weeks, as many of the important bills are ready for floor action.

Thorough committee study of the bills should eliminate lengthy floor debates and hasten the good bills on their way, once they do reach the House and Senate.

Tax Bill to Be Amended
In my last week's new letter I explained HB 1001, which relates to income taxes and would (according to state tax authorities) reduce state income taxes by approximately 10 percent. Before this bill was sent to the House for a vote, it was amended so that anyone making \$600 or less would be exempt from income tax.

After a three-hour debate on Thursday morning, HB 1001 was defeated by three votes. On Friday, after a promise making an amendment which would allow income tax deductions on charitable contributions, a vote to reconsider the bill passed. I expect it to pass the House in the amended form.

Inventory Tax Bill Opposed
HB 1010 is also having a rough time. A hearing was held on this amended inventory tax bill Friday. The amendments provide that all personal property be removed from the tax field and in place of this a 2.7 percent gross business income tax to be assessed. This is vigorously opposed by power companies, railroads, manufacturers, etc.

SB 453 provides for an appropriation of \$75,000 to be used for scholarships for Oregon resident students, who need financial aid, who have high intellectual standing and who plan to be fulltime students. The scholarships would be renewable for four years. Fifty of these \$500 scholarships would be administered the first year and the total would eventually be increased to a maximum of 400.

This much of the bill is fine but tacked onto it is an appropri-

ation of \$24,000 for administration. In other words, for every dollar that the student received we taxpayers would pay \$1.328. Are you in favor of this?

Bill Increases Board Members
HB 1068 would expand the board of education from seven to nine members in addition to giving the board the duty of appointing the state superintendent of public instruction and setting his salary. This bill has the approval of the House Education committee which disapproved of giving the above powers to the governor.

SB 502 relates to the picketing of places of agriculture production while perishable crops are being planted or harvested. This bill was designed to prohibit picketing by a third party. Only employees of the farmer would be permitted to picket and then only in labor disputes involving wages, hours and working conditions.

HB 1398 relates to the horse racing season. Horse racing would be allowed between March 1 and Nov. 30, rather than limiting the time between April 1 and Nov. 1, as it now is. This bill would change the 60-day limitation on racing in a county so it does not include racing at county fairs as part of those 60 days. Passage has been recommended.

Bill to Aid Eastern Oregon
The reapportionment bill that is scheduled to be before the House on Wednesday, March 13, will be good for eastern Oregon (the area east of the Cascade mountains), inasmuch as we would lose only one state representative. This bill is drawing much opposition from the heavily populated areas.

I understand that Rep. George Annala, chairman of the House Elections committee, has been assured of enough votes to get this bill through the House.

HB 1340, relating to the employment of individuals in place of employees involved in a labor dispute, was referred to the committee on labor and industries on Feb. 3. Many of these bills will not get out of the committee rooms.

Purpose of SB 61 is to bring under unemployment compensation coverage employees who in addition to processing their own crops also process crops of others. This bill has been in the Senate Agricultural committee since Jan. 18.

Yesterday the weather man predicted "rain and partial clearing" for this area today. If Malheur county could have the rain that has fallen here during the last 24 hours, it would help considerably in relieving the water shortage.

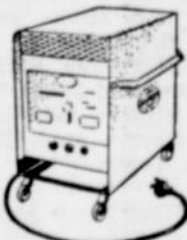
LOCAL BOWLING TEAM ATTENDS IDAHO TOURNEY

MORE NO. 1 POTATOES

Proper fertilization will increase the percentage of No 1 potatoes harvested. In carefully supervised field tests near Paul, Idaho, application of 150-180 pounds of available nitrogen for potato production and 120 pounds of phosphate produced 15% more No. 1 potatoes and 32% more ten-ounce potatoes than did lower rates of fertilization.

FERTILIZER RECOMMENDATIONS

Recommendations of the intermountain area call for 100-120 pounds of available nitrogen per acre on land that has been in production for some time. Newly developed land requires from 200-240 pounds of available nitrogen for maximum yields.

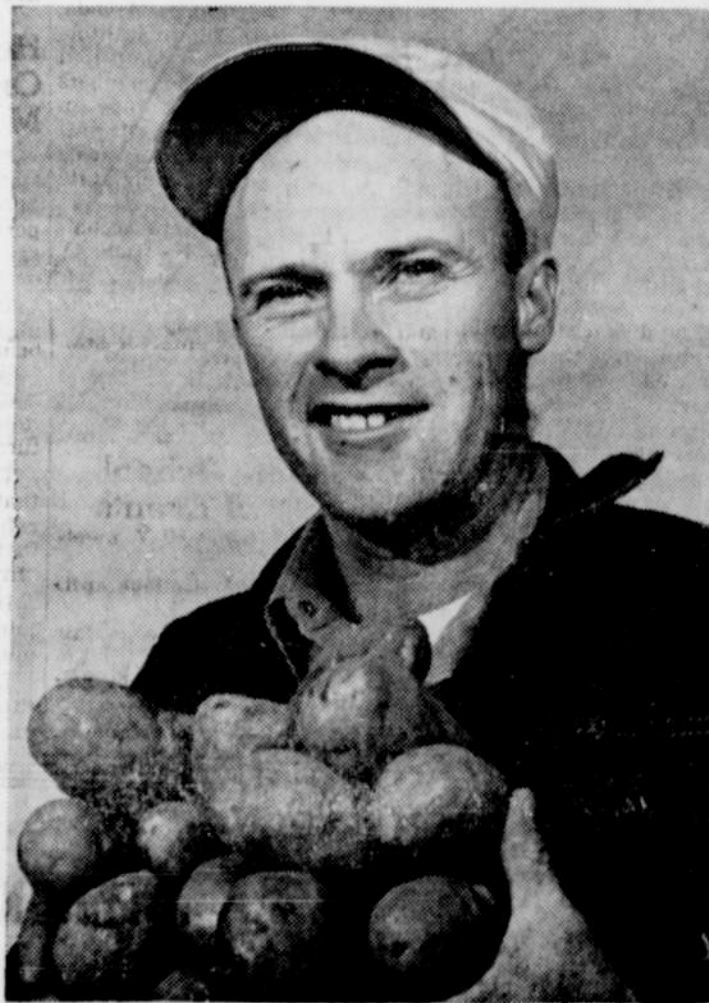
