Annual Livestock Feeders' Day Set Friday, March 31

A report on results of a recently completed high concentrate trial involving barley and dried beet pulp by J. J. Dahmen, superintendent of Caldwell experiment station, will highlight the speaking program of the annual Livestock Feeders' day at Malheur branch experiment station Friday, March 31, according to E. N. Hoffman, superintendent.

These trials were completed last fall and will be reported in detail in addition to current work now under way.

Also to be reported are results of the 140-day trial at the Malheur station which will be completed March 24. Rations in these trials have included various combinations of rolled barley, dried beet pulp and ground ear corn, Hoffman said.

The program will start at noon with the free lunch annually sponsored by the Chambers of Commerce of Ontario, Vale and Nyssa and the Ontario Kiwanis club. The public is invited to the March 31 event.
