Teresa Haburchak served refreshments at the close of the meeting.

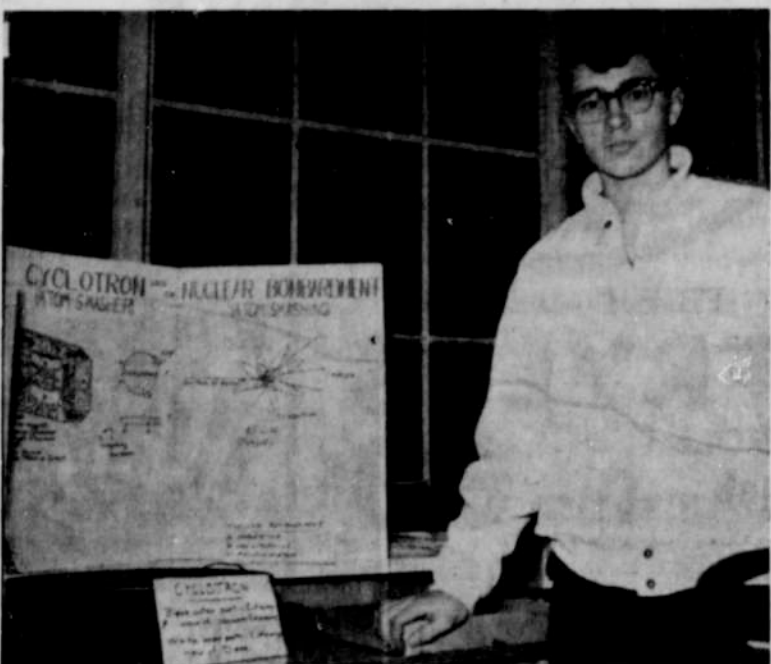

Freight Shipments Show 1960 Decrease

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Vaughn and Bill Stringer, shipped here from Idaho for wintering and spring lambing.

Of the cars forwarded the top 10 were: (1) sugar beets, 2297; (2) sugar, 1527, shipped to the Pacific Northwest for distribution; (3) spuds, 878, mostly to Kansas City for all the midwest, east and south; (4) beet pulp, 464, to many points for stock feed.

(5) onions, 392; (6) residuum (left from sugar beet refining), 295; (7) molasses, 205; (8) wheat, 98, mostly to Portland; (9) cattle, 92, largely belonging to Stringers and shipped to Spencer, Idaho, for summer pasture; (10) lime sludge, 64, sent to Willamette valley to be used on sour land.

Among items showing largest gains (incoming shipments) were: propane gas, 24 (Ideal Gas and Appliance); milo, 16; sewer pipe, 16 (being used now in the additions to Nyssa's sewer system); animal and poultry food, 15; and cans, 13, for Idaho Canning company.

A breakdown of car movements by months reveals that for incoming shipments, November is highest with 2835, getting lesser each month through February when Amalgamated is nearing the end of its campaign. The low month is May with 11, followed by June with 33.

Cars forwarded do not show as much variation as the incoming. Highest month in this class is January with 1047, going down to a low of 230 in March.

Wheat Mixture Less Than 50% Is Outside Of Marketing Quota

Malheur County ASC committee announced this week that regulations pertaining to wheat acreage allotments and marketing quotas have been changed with respect to wheat mixtures.

The same counties which were designated as "wheat mixture counties" for the 1959 wheat crop are considered wheat mixture counties for the 1961 and subsequent crops of wheat. Malheur county was considered a wheat mixture county in 1959.

Wheat mixture provisions are that a mixture of wheat and other grains which contains less than 50 percent wheat by weight at time of harvest will not be subject to marketing quota penalties. Producers having any questions regarding this revision, are asked to contact their ASC office.
