

Driver Age Bill Adds Applicants, Auto Test Failures

Talk of raising the minimum driving age has brought a surge of youngsters into the Oregon Department of Motor Vehicles to take drivers tests—many of them ill-prepared, according to Vern L. Hill, director of the department. Hill said parents should make sure their youngsters are ready to take the test before allowing them to apply.

According to department records, 28 percent of applicants for original driver licenses normally fail the driving demonstration on the first attempt.

During one day of the recent spring vacation week, the average went to 56 percent, reflecting, Hill said, "a rush by 16-18 year old youngsters to get under the wire of a possible age raise."

"Parents have available a powerful control over the driving privilege of their under-18 youngsters," he said. "It's that signature of consent."

Without the signature of the parent, the youngster may not take the driving test and may not legally operate a motor vehicle. The signature of consent may be withdrawn by the parent whenever he feels he has cause.
