**Sixty-Two Malheur Youths to Attend 4-H Summer School**

Annual 4-H club summer school at Oregon State university has been shortened this year, according to E. M. Hauser, county extension agent.

The session is scheduled for Monday through Saturday, June 12-17, which cuts off two days from the schedule of last year. There will be four days of actual classes on the OSU campus, with two days allowed for travel.

Malheur county has a quota of 62 members who may attend. Quotas are set up by the state 4-H club office, based on 4-H enrollment in the county.

Local members will be attending on scholarships provided by sponsoring organizations. Some of these scholarships have been won in county and state fair participation, while others will be presented for general achievement in the community and county.

Scholarship winners at the 1960 county fair include Pauline Butler, Adrian; Beth Sather, Cairo; Sally Griffin, Willowcreek; Terry Tallman, Ridgeview; Bob Thompson, Hylina; and Frances Cleaver, Oregon Trail.

Winners of community and county scholarships will be selected next week from the list of 4-H members who have sent applications into the county extension office in Ontario.

**I. Ayyoub Receives Science Foundation Scholarship Award**

Word has been received that Ibrahim Ayyoub, son-in-law of the J. W. Rigney's of Nyssa, has been granted a scholarship in the amount of \$900 from the National Science foundation.

As a result of the scholarship, "Abe," as he is known to a number of Nyssa friends, will attend Mathematics Summer institute at Oregon State university in Corvallis this summer.

During the session he will continue graduate studies in mathematics. He is currently an instructor of mathematics at Yakima Valley Junior college in Yakima, Wash.

**New Interest Rate Effective April 1 On Land Bank Loans**

Interest rate on new land bank loans has been reduced to 5 1/2 percent, Dan E. Roberts, manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Ontario, reported this week. The reduction became effective April 1.

Roberts said that borrowers with 6 percent loans already on the books of the Federal Land Bank of Spokane also will benefit from the reduction. The bank, for which the Ontario association makes and services loans, is advising its 6 percent borrowers that, until further notice, the 5 1/2 percent rate will be applied to their loans commencing April 1.

"This voluntary interest rate reduction on outstanding loans represents an interest savings at the rate of \$325,000 annually to 4,500 farmers and ranchers with 6 percent loans in Idaho, Montana, Oregon, Washington and Alaska, the territory served by the Spokane bank," Roberts said. The association manager pointed out that the interest rate reduction reflects an improvement in the general money situation and carries out the policy of the land bank system to extend credit at lowest cost possible consistent with sound business practices.

"The bank's interest rate," said Roberts, "is geared to the cost of money in the investment markets where the bank sells bonds to raise funds with which to make its loans."

The Ontario association serves Malheur, Payette, Adams and Washington counties.

**Sen. Yturri Defends Bill Lowering Weight-Mile Tax on Heavy Trucks; Opposes Repeal of Responsibility Act**

The people of Eastern Oregon will be pleased to know that the governor has signed the Boardman bombing range bill which will enable the state to acquire this site, in order that it may enter into a lease with the Boeing Airplane company. The bill, as signed, provides that the state may acquire the property either by exchange or purchase.

The trading stamp bill which has disturbed many people in Oregon will no longer be a factor in this session. It was tabled by a vote of 5 to 4 in the House State and Federal Affairs committee a few days ago.

**Legal Publication Simplified**

The Malheur Memorial hospital district will be pleased to know that House Bill 285 which would permit them to publish annually a summary statement of receipts and expenditures, has passed the senate. This will eliminate the requirement to publish itemized statements of receipts and expenditures. These districts are under the local budget law, their accounts are audited, approved by the county court and filed with the county clerk.

These steps, plus the annual publication in summary form will give adequate notice to the public although to a slight extent it will be detrimental to the newspapers. Many districts have not observed the law because exact conformity thereto would require publication of the names of patients which is regarded as confidential.

**Woman Senator Replaced**

Senator Jean Lewis, the only woman senator for many years from Multnomah county, was appointed to the Domestic Relations court in Portland and has been replaced by former Senator Ward Cook. Senator Cook was unsuccessful in his attempt to defeat Howard Belton for the office of state treasurer at the last election.

Senator Ward Cook is not to be confused with Senator Vernon Cook, and we anticipate that while both are of the same political party, their votes will frequently differ. Senator Ward Cook is generally associated with the conservative element of the Democratic party in the senate.

Senate Bill 32, which would make more equitable the weight-mile taxes on heavy trucks, passed the senate by a vote of 20 to 9 some days ago and only yesterday passed the house by a vote of 38 to 22. There have been claims that passage of this bill would be disastrous in that it would reduce the income of the highway department by approximately \$1 million a year.

Nevertheless, the majority of both houses believe that the existing tax was inequitable and in their eyes the justice of a law cannot be measured solely by the amount of revenue it produces. For example, it is certain that the public would raise in rebellion if income taxes were increased substantially. This, too, would produce additional revenue but would be most unjust.

The State Highway department will still continue to receive at least \$15 million a year from these heavier trucks. In the event that it should be discovered that an error has been made, the next legislature can readily correct it, but for at least six years this particular segment of our industry and its pleas for equity have been ignored.

The Senate Judiciary committee passed out Senate Bill 461 which would repeal the Relative Responsibility act. This would cost the state some \$6 million a

New officers were installed by Mrs. Charles J. Smith when Malheur Memorial hospital auxiliary members met in regular session March 27 at the hospital.

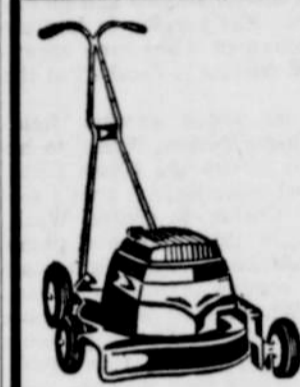
