### Louis DeCamp Barr Dies in California

Word has been received by the Journal of the death of Louis DeCamp Barr in Orinda, Calif.

Mr. Barr will be remembered by many Nyssa area residents for his work with the founders' organization of Malheur Memorial hospital. He came here originally at request of the organization for the purpose of establishing the hospital fund drive and worked in Nyssa during three campaigns.

He was described by one Nyssa businessman, who worked with him on the fund drives, as having a dynamic personality. The local man said, "He really made us work, but I feel sure that we would not have had the hospital without his guidance and assistance."

Mr. Barr, president of Barr Method of Planning and Financing, headed fund raising drives to erect many hospitals, motels and hotels throughout the western part of the country.

He had been a Mason since 1909 and was a member of the Oakland Consistory, Scottish Rite Bodies and Ahahes Temple of the Shrine. He was also a member of the First Congregational church of Oakland, Oakland Kiwanis club and past governor of Pacific Northwest district of Kiwanis clubs.

He succumbed March 29 following a brief illness. Survivors include his widow, Carolyn of the home at 16 Los Amigos, Orinda; one daughter, Mrs. Anne Sanford and two grandchildren.

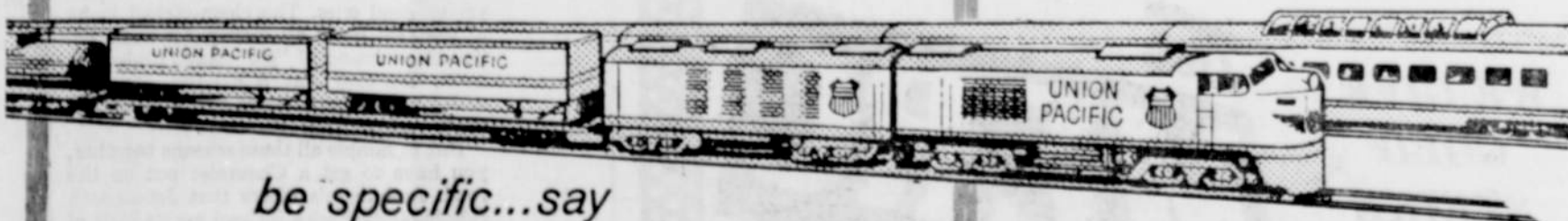
