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completed. He estimated that about 60 percent of the total was up and that thinning operations had begun on quite a number of farms.

Some of the thinning is being done with hand labor but a greater proportion than last year is being done mechanically. Factory fieldmen are advising growers to mechanize as much as possible and use hand labor for the balance.

He reported that most of the fields are getting dry and that some of the growers had started irrigating. When asked about the water supply, he said, "Four acre feet with careful use is sufficient to grow a good beet crop. The thing we are worried about right now is a recurrence of the freeze that came last year."

Zobell said that the company had experimented with the use of about 10,000 pounds of seed to plant 800 acres of beets. The regular seed is pelleted (coated) and this makes it nearer possible for complete mechanization in planting and thinning than with the plain seed. He termed the experiment "very promising."

State Ag Agency To Enter Protest On 'Pumped' Ham

The federal department of agriculture will hold a hearing in Portland at the U.S. courthouse on May 11 on its "watered" ham order of last Dec. 30.

At this time the Oregon department of agriculture will enter a protest on the federal order, which allows 10 percent added moisture in uncooked smoked hams and other smoked porks shipped interstate.

Dr. M. L. Houston, supervisor of meat inspection for the Oregon department, says the new federal order is directly opposed to Oregon laws for consumer protection which aim to prevent misbranding, mislabeling and adulteration.

"We believe that 'pumping' of hams without adequate labeling to inform the consumer of added moisture is a form of adulteration," Dr. Houston says, "and the department will take a stand against this practice at the May 11 hearing."

The federal regulation on moisture in hams was adopted without giving consumer groups an opportunity to present their recommendations.

The hearing in Portland, one of five hearings over the country, opens up the question so consumers and others interested may present their views. Meantime, the order continues in effect, with no requirement that the added water "pumped" into hams be shown on the label.

In actual practice, Dr. Houston says the weight added to ham may be 13 percent, including 10 percent water and 3 percent curing salts.
