

State Trout Season Opens Saturday; Streams in 'Fair to Good' Condition

Oregon anglers, estimated at 350,000 by the state game department, will take to the outdoors this weekend for opening of the general statewide trout season. The season will start Saturday, April 22, and unless there is a complete reversal of past seasons, practically every lake and stream in the state will get a good working over before Monday morning.

Many will head directly for pre-picked "hot spots" that have produced for them before. Daylight will find many whipping the water with bait or fly, since they will have gone to these choice locations on Friday night.

The state has made a recent forecast on the condition of lakes and streams and what success may be expected for fishermen all over the state. In zone 8 (Southeastern Oregon) they say, "Burnt river below Unity dam is always a good producer for good-sized rainbows. This is a popular spot, so get there early and get a good location."

"Powder river above Baker is a likely stream, stocked heavily with rainbow trout. The high desert country shows promise for good angling but some of the lakes of the region are inaccessible."

"Malheur reservoir is low but the water is in fair condition. Boatmen will have some difficulty in launching boats, especially the large ones. North fork and middle fork of Malheur are expected good."

State Board Offers Safety Check List For Boat Owners

With the opening of fishing season the State Marine board urges boat owners to check their boat registration and safety equipment. The following check list would apply to an outboard motorboat under 26 feet in length:

1. A Coast Guard approved life-saving device (life jacket, life preserver, ring buoy or buoyant cushion) in good serviceable condition for each person on board.
 2. Proper lights if boat is to be used after sunset or before sunrise.
 3. Coast Guard approved fire extinguisher.
 4. Whistle or horn if boat is over 16 feet in length.
 5. Annual boat license if boat is 12 feet in length or longer.
 6. Certificate of number if motor is 10 horsepower or more.
- Last, but not least, the board urges courtesy and common sense afloat and offers these safety tips:
1. Do not overload.
 2. Do not stand up in a small, open boat.
 3. Never make a sharp turn at high speed.
 4. Keep a sharp lookout for other boats, rocks, logs or other obstructions.
 5. Watch the weather.
 6. Always have children and non-swimmers wear their life preservers and, in small, open boats, everyone should wear a life preserver.

Students Attend Boise Conference

Nyssa was one of 51 schools and youth groups attending the 1961 session of YMCA youth legislature. It was held April 14-15. In all, 39 bills, six joint resolutions, two concurrent resolutions and one memorial were introduced at the session.

Attending from Nyssa's Hi-Y club were president Forrest Huffman, Skip Nakashima, Gilbert Lopez, Paul Okano and Richard Krause. Each one of the participating groups from throughout the state had one senator and one representative in the mock legislature.

It is the second oldest such youth law-making program in the United States, beginning in the mid-1930's. Now responsible for organizing the program, which is a year-long process, is W. D. Stuber, YMCA area associate secretary.

The session got under way Friday. Two houses met and organized, electing a floor leader and assistant floor leader. The party system was not used. Then both houses met in a joint session for the oath of office.

The secretary of state presented the students with certificates of election. There were also addresses by the youth governor and lieutenant governor. Friday afternoon was taken up by committee meetings.

The governor's ball was held Friday night. Saturday the youths put in a full day making proposed legislation into law or rejecting the legislation.

ADULT READING:

"The Rise and Fall of the Third Reich" by William L. Shirer. Here for the first time is the complete story of Hitler's empire, one of the most important stories ever told. This record included the testimony of Nazi leaders and of concentration camp inmates, the diaries of officials, transcripts of secret conferences, army orders, private letters—all the vast paper work behind a conspiracy to conquer the world.

"Mountains Ahead" by Martha Ferguson McKeown. The Oregon Trail will live forever in the legends and romance of America. This novel of the Oregon Trail in 1847 is a chronicle of human travail of mind, body and spirit. It tells the story as it has never been told before of the women who could share with their men the high adventure and grueling struggle.

"One Week in March" by Mark Sherwin and Charles Lam Markmann. In the very short span of seven days—the first week of March 1933—events occurred which were to affect the course and destiny of human history. It was the week when Franklin Delano Roosevelt was inaugurated as the 32nd President of the United States.

"The Public Years" by Bernard M. Baruch. Mr. Baruch begins this book with his departure from Wall street, after an astounding career in finance, to enter public life. He tells of the problems that confronted him as chairman of the War Industries board during World War I and of his role as an adviser to Woodrow Wilson in shaping of the Treaty of Versailles.
