BALLOU'S SIXTH GRADE CLASS TAKES FIELD TRIP

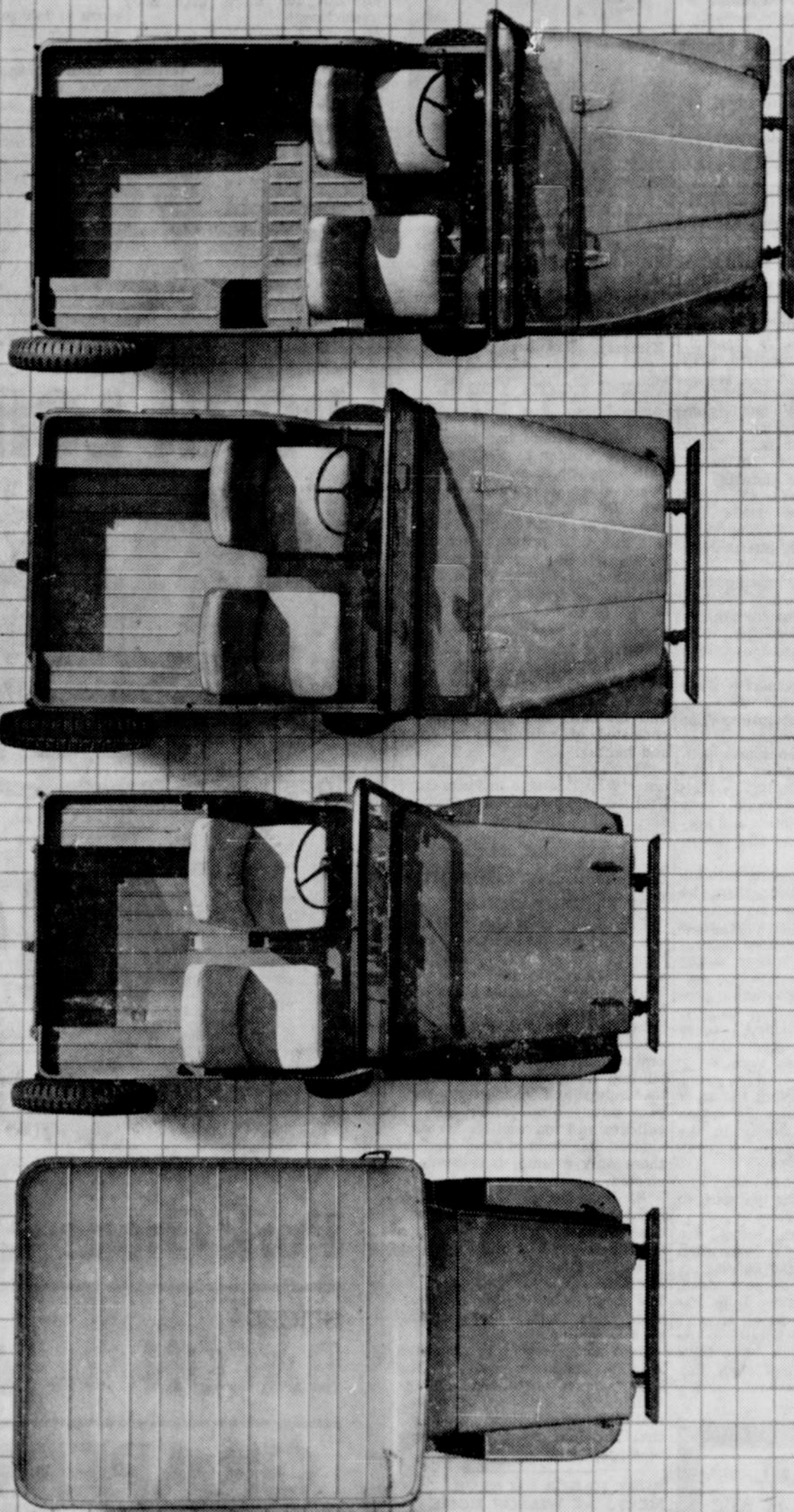
A field trip to Owyhee river was taken May 5 by members of Elvin Ballou's sixth grade class. They were accompanied by Wayne Stites, bus driver; Mrs. Bill Hamilton, Mrs. Mel Beck, Mrs. Stites and Ben McConnell.

Purpose of the excursion was to collect wild flowers, insects and animal life, both microscopic and that visible to the eye.

Students made presses out of scrap lumber which they used to press the flowers. Specimens were studied and named and placed on display in the hallway of the grade school building for other students to observe.

Included in the display were soil and water samples which contained microscopic animal life.

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
