MISSIONARY FROM KOREA

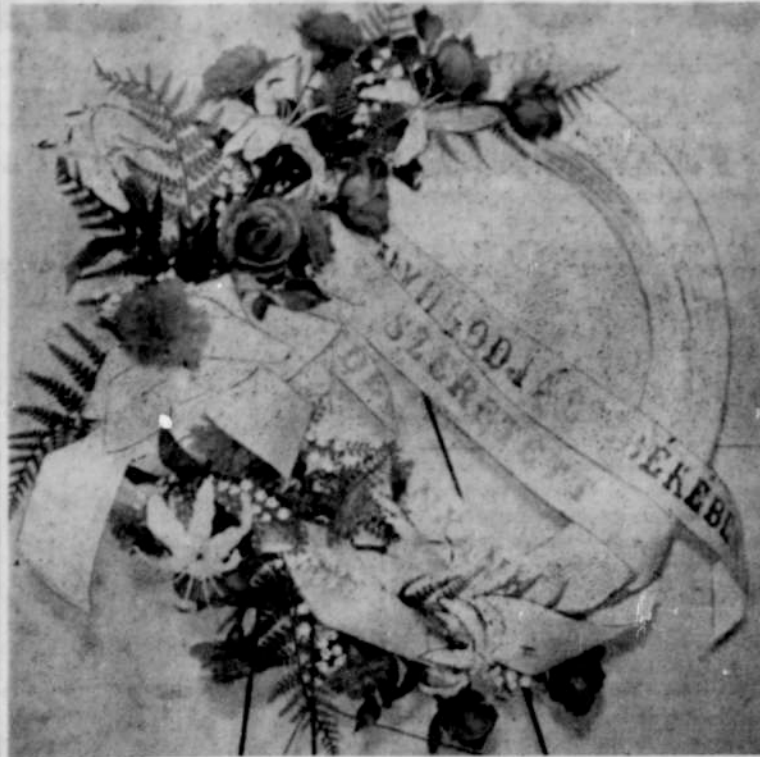
The Rev. Richard Johnston, re-

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George R. L. Smit
Rites Held Tuesday

Funeral services for George Ru-
dolf Leonardus Smit were con-
ducted Tuesday morning, May 23,
1961, at Lienkaemper chapel with
the Rev. John L. Briehl officiat-
ing.

Mr. Smit was born June 6, 1882,
in Amsterdam, Holland, a son of
George and Ida Smit. He suc-
cumbed May 21, 1961, at his home
in the Nu Acres community.

He was baptized and later re-
newed his baptismal vows in the
rite of confirmation in the Lu-
theran church of Holland.

In 1905 he came to the Nyssa
area and in 1915 was united in
marriage to Alida Krut in Seat-
tle, Wash. After marriage the
couple continued to live in the
Nyssa area.

In 1941 the Smit family moved
to the present home in Nu Acres.
This land was their homestead,
purchased many years before and
awaiting irrigation.

In addition to his widow of the
home, Mr. Smit is survived by
three sons, John and George of
Nu Acres and Jake of Pocatello,
Idaho; one daughter, Mrs. Ida
Galland of Council, Idaho; and
