

City Librarian Releases List of New Books Available to Patrons in Nyssa

City Librarian Joy Bell lists the following books as having been recently added to shelves of the city library:

ADULT VOLUMES

"The Self-Conscious Society" by Eric Larrabee. In clear terms the author discusses class culture and mass culture—the media, sex and censorship; the defense debate; children; the role of America in the world; and the conflict between Puritan ideals and Keynesian reality.

"Summerhill (A Radical Approach to Child Rearing)" by A. S. Neill. Summerhill is perhaps the most unusual school in the world. Here's a place where children are not compelled to go to class—they can stay away from lessons for years, if they want to. Yet, strangely enough, the boys and girls in this school learn!

"The Moonrakers" by Robert Carse. This is the story of the Clipper Ship Men, of that era of the daring men who built and sailed the greatest ships that ever bore canvas.

"Patriot's Lady" by Lois Hobart. This is the life of Sarah Livingston Jay. The peaceful life the Jays enjoyed in New York City ended suddenly when John became a member of the Continental Congress. Sally steadfastly approved when he joined those who pledged "our lives, our fortunes, and our sacred honor" to the American cause, though it was her first taste of the clash between patriotism and domestic happiness.

"Half Angel" by Barbara Jeffers. The completely engaging story of a little boy and his pet—a story whose gentleness, warmth and heartbreak is reminiscent of "The Yearling."

"Hymns We Love" by Cecil Northcott. One hundred hymns that people love and sing above all others; also the human stories behind these beloved hymns; bring readers closer to an acquaintance with the dedicated men and women who through their songs of worship, praise and devotion have given so much comfort, challenge and inspiration to hymn singers.

"Driftwood in the Home" by Florence M. Schaffer. Here is the first book to be devoted exclusively to driftwood for interior decoration. It tells how to treat the wood, shape it, finish it and use it effectively in any kind of home and room.

"Personality Plus!" by Sheila John Daly. This popular book is on how to make your personality count. It covers how to be a good sport, shyness, how to make interesting conversation, how to get a date, how to be a good student and careers and jobs.

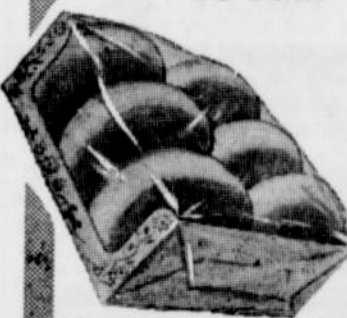
