

D. Forbess Wins Chemistry Award As Top Student

Dennis Lynn Forbess has been named 1961 winner of the honor medal for top graduating chemistry student at the University of Oregon, it was announced recently by university authorities.

The honor medal is awarded by western chapter of the American Institute of Chemists to top senior chemistry students at selected colleges in the region. This will be the tenth annual award.

In selecting the top student, scholastic accomplishment, leadership and character were considered. Forbess has a 3.62 grade point average. The award was presented Tuesday, May 23, at a chemistry seminar.

Forbess, son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard A. Forbess of 104 North Fifth, Nyssa, was recently elected to membership in the university chapter of Sigma Xi, national science honorary. He was also recently initiated into Phi Beta Kappa, national liberal arts scholastic honorary.

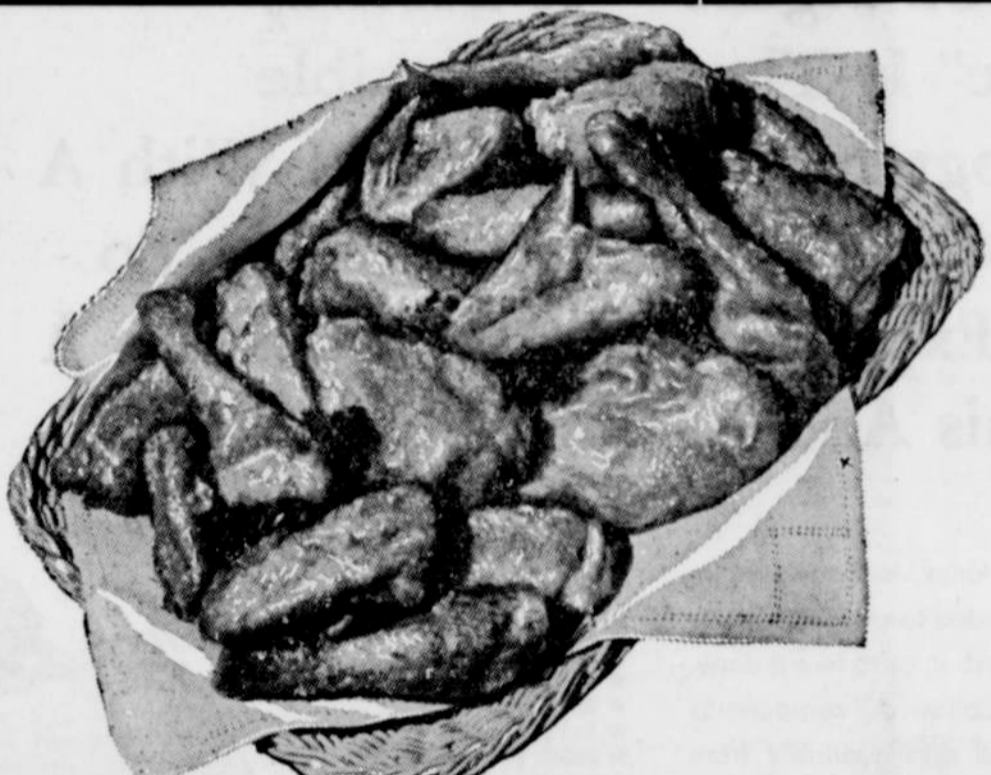
