**State Dairy Trend Shows Less Cows, More Production**

Fewer cows, but more milk per cow. That's been the trend in Oregon's dairy industry over the past 10 years, reports Stephen C. Marks, extension agricultural economist at Oregon State university.

The increased production from each cow hasn't been enough to offset the decrease in Oregon milk cow numbers, however, the economist found as he studied reports from the U. S. Department of Agriculture. As a result, milk production in the state during the first four months of 1961 trailed that of a year earlier by nearly one percent, in line with the downward trend established during the last decade.

Even so, the recent drop in milk prices seems to indicate a surplus of milk in the state, Marks said. This is apparently due to shipments of milk coming into Oregon from Washington and Idaho, he explained. Milk production in the neighboring states has been climbing gradually but steadily since 1956.

The downward trend of the milk industry in Oregon was sharply outlined by the Census of Agriculture taken the fall of 1959, Marks added. At that time, only 19,755 Oregon farms reported owning milk cows, compared to 38,396 farms in the state reporting milk cow ownership in April 1950.

This indicates the number of dairy farms in Oregon declined almost 50 percent during the nine years between the spring of 1950 and the fall of 1959.

At the same time the number of milk cows on farms in the state dropped 25 percent, from 203,817 in 1950 to 152,226 head in 1959.

Oregon dairy farmers who have stayed in business have grown larger during the period, Marks also noted. They apparently did this so they could take advantage of new equipment and production methods, as well as gain access to better markets and offset effects of rising costs.

The 1959 census showed the average number of cows per farm in the state increased from 5.3 head in 1950 to 7.7 in 1959. Average production per cow also rose steadily, from an annual average of 5940 pounds of milk per cow in 1950 to a record high of 7060 pounds per cow in 1960.
