Teachers Attend Summer Courses

Attending advance placement workshops this summer will be Douglas E. Wilkerson and Clyde T. Swisher. The workshops are designed to help formulate the content of an advanced placement course.

The advance placement course is a course normally given on the freshman and sophomore college level but offered to seniors capable of college level work.

Swisher will attend the University of Oregon Aug. 3-18. His workshop is for teachers who will teach an advanced placement course in composition and literature.

In charge of the workshop at Eugene will be Dr. Fred Stocking from Williams college. Outstanding scholars from leading universities will head the workshop.

Wilkerson will attend Oregon State university Aug. 13-26. His workshop is for teachers who will teach an advanced placement course in biology.

Dr. Donald Humphrey and other staff members of OSU will be the lecturers and discussion leaders at Corvallis. Morning sessions will be devoted to lectures and afternoon sessions to individual research, writing and reading.

All expenses are paid for the trip by Ford foundation, which is the agency that finances advanced placement courses in Oregon.
