

County Delegates Attend 4-H School At Oregon State

More than 60 4-H club members and leaders from the county are attending annual 4-H summer school at Oregon State university, according to E. M. Hauser, county extension agent.

Delegates are attending on scholarships provided by fair boards, community and county organizations and by business firms in the valley. Practically every community with any appreciable amount of 4-H club work is represented by one or more delegates.

Summer school is from June 12 to 17, with Monday reserved for registration and orientation meetings, classes and supervised activities Tuesday through Friday. Delegates are scheduled to return home Saturday.

4-H leaders supervising the Malheur delegation are Mrs. Laura Brock of Adrian and Mrs. Lois Hoffman of Cairo. Janice Gumprecht and Hauser, county extension agents, are also accompanying the group.

Last year while Chester was county judge the county paid \$8000 for a sale barn on the fair grounds but he said it was allocated for this particular purpose before approved by the county commissioners.

Malheur Youths To Be Selected For Range Camp

Four Malheur county youths, ages 14 to 18, will be eligible to attend the all-expense paid youth range camp at Malheur game refuge in Harney county July 31 to Aug. 5, it has been announced by George Russell, He is Malheur county committeeman for the American society of range management and will assist in selecting the Malheur boys.

Two boys will be chosen on basis of range plant and management knowledge and the others will be selected for outstanding citizenship and leadership qualities.

Learn of Outdoor Activities

Subjects taught at the camp will include identification of plants, use of hunting and fishing equipment, how to get along in the woods, what to do if lost and problems involved in managing ranges, both open sagebrush and forest.

A number of contests will be conducted during camp session, which will include finding and naming plants growing in the camp area. On the final day of the outing, 100 plants will be tagged in some adjacent range area and the boys given approximately three hours to find the plants and identify them. Prizes will be given to individuals and to groups all during the week. One day will be devoted to visiting several livestock ranches in the vicinity.

1960 Participants Named

Youths attending camp last year and their sponsors were Andrew Child of Nyssa, Malheur County Farm Bureau; Bobby Maag of Vale, Malheur County Cattleman's association; LeRoy McBride of Jamieson, Malheur County Pomona Grange and Glen J. Schoessler of Ontario, Vale and Ontario branches of U. S. National bank.

According to Russell, a local committee will be named to help select the two youths eligible to attend on the basis of leadership and citizenship. The others must be 4-H or FFA members and will be chosen on range knowledge.

Application blanks and details may be obtained from the office of E. M. Hauser, county agent in Ontario. Applications must be in by July 15, Russell added.

policy along the same lines as voiced by Rinehart, to charge \$2.85 per front foot of the property served.

Explains Background of Contract

Henigson's explanation of the Henigson-Jackson sewer contract with the city and all the background leading up to the signing of it, was for the benefit of Journal editor Ted Brammer, who was in attendance in a reporting capacity.

Brammer asked for an explanation of a portion of the minutes taken from the May 23, 1961, meeting concerning the contract that appeared to be in conflict with what had been told him verbally by both Jackson and Henigson.

The contract was dated May 9, 1961, and signed May 23, 1961, while the minutes of a May 23, 1961, meeting read as follows: "Councilman Maxfield made a motion that the sewer contract be signed by mayor and city recorder with the understanding that as soon as possible the property owned by Wilton Jackson and Harold Henigson be annexed to the city of Nyssa. Motion seconded by councilman Sallee. Motion carried."

Brammer's question was to learn: (1) if this was a condition of the contract and (2) if the effective date of the contract was May 9 (two weeks before the motion was made), why was it being discussed after final terms had been agreed upon before.

"Not a Condition of Contract"

Henigson inferred that Brammer had agitated against the contract and said it was possible to read what one wanted to find in

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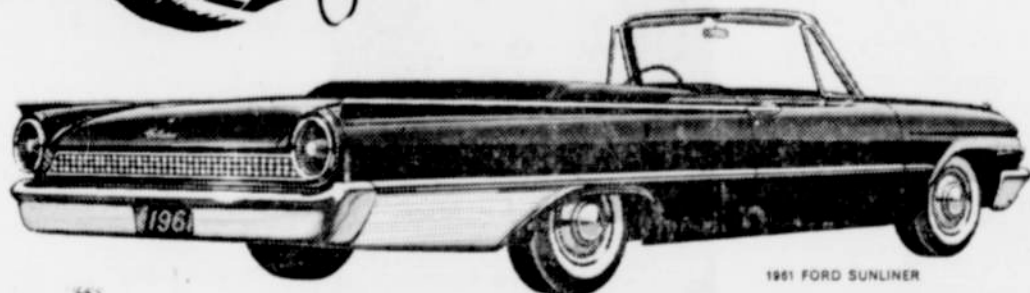
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
