Funeral Rites Held Saturday Morning For C. Klinkenberg

Funeral services for Cornelius Klinkenberg were held Saturday, June 17, 1961, at Lienkaemper chapel with the Rev. Paul Ludlow officiating.

Mr. Klinkenberg was born Feb. 3, 1875, in Cawker City, Kan., a son of Cornelius and Margaret Klinkenberg. He succumbed Wednesday, June 14, following a recent heart attack.

He moved to western Washington in 1896 and was married to Margaret Sumpter on July 7, 1901. The family moved to Burns, Ore., in 1911 and came to Nyssa in 1917.

Mr. Klinkenberg retired 14 years ago from the draying and trucking business.

During his active years he was a member of Modern Woodmen of America and Odd Fellows lodge. Since his retirement, Mr. Klinkenberg spent most of his time in his garden.

There were four chronological facts that were prominent in the life of Cornelius Klinkenberg. He lived to be 86 years of age, 15 years beyond the national average; he lacked only three weeks of reaching his 60th wedding anniversary; he had lived in Nyssa 44 years and resided in the same dwelling for 42 years.

In addition to his widow, Margaret of the home, survivors include four sons, William Ted of California, Marion of Portland, Paul Lester and Gilbert of Nyssa; one daughter, Frances Lewellen of Vale.

Among other survivors are two sisters, Mrs. Harriet Smith and Mrs. Allie Inman of Topeka, Kan.; 21 grandchildren and 18 great-grandchildren.

Interment was made in Nyssa cemetery under direction of Lienkaemper chapel. Pallbearers were Mr. Klinkenberg's sons, Paul Lester and William Ted; grandsons, Dan and Charles Klinkenberg and Robert and Clayton Lewellen.
