Rules in effect under the marketing agreement last season set the minimum size at two inches diameter or four ounce weight for all varieties except for round varieties which were set at 1 1/2 inches. All varieties met U.S. No. 2 or better grade and the maturity regulation on all varieties was set at a "slightly skinned" standard.

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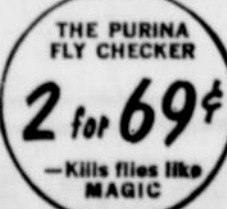


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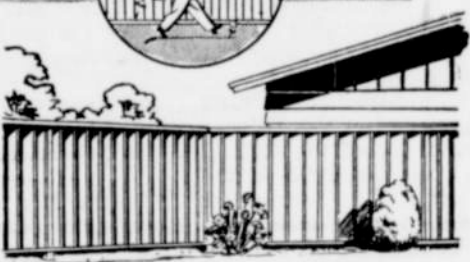
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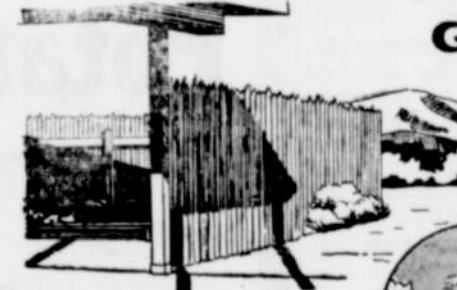
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
