Specialist Lists Tips for Outdoor Meal Planning

As mealtime moves outdoors these warm summer days, simple menus, easy-to-carry foods and a central "supply" system for outdoor eating items are recommended by Oregon State university extension specialists.

Zelma Reigle, food marketing specialist, suggests these ways to keep meal preparation to a minimum for backyard cookouts or picnics:

Keep outdoor eating equipment and supplies in one convenient place—ready to use or take on a picnic at a moment's notice. Include napkins and paper towels, salt and pepper, can and bottle opener, matches, bug bomb, flashlight, insulated plastic bag to carry hot or cold food, vacuum bottle, mustard and catsup and disposable plastic cups, plates and eating utensils.

Miss Reigle suggests that shoppers include season's plentiful foods in picnic menus. In meats, lamb and broiler fryers are in abundant supply and low-priced. She suggests cutting boneless cubes from lamb shoulder roast, marinating and broiling on skewers.

Big supplies of new potatoes at low prices are especially tasty boiled in jackets for potato salad, or as hash browns over an open fire. Other June plentifuls in fruits and vegetables include Oregon-grown strawberries, pineapples, melons, lemons, celery, corn, cucumbers, eggplant, tomatoes and beets.

Baked goods that are "seasoned travelers" include rolls, cookies, donuts, fruit pies and cupcakes. Miss Reigle advises that cream-filled desserts are not good hot weather travelers because of the possibility of food poisoning.

Prepare salad greens and crisp relishes in advance. Chill, pack in plastic bags and then they're ready for the picnic or cookout. Toss salad makings with a dressing just before eating for a crisp salad.

When shopping for hot dogs, read labels, she suggests. Some wieners are all beef; some contain added moisture, dried milk solids or cereals. Flavor depends on ingredients, seasonings and smoking. Her recommendation is to try several brands—then stick to those your family likes best.

OSU Specialists List Food Precautions For Summer Weather

Warm weather brings greater demands for caution with food, remind Oregon State university extension specialists.

They suggest guarding the family's health against food poisoning by planning to use low-acid or bland foods soon after preparation. If it's necessary to prepare foods ahead of mealtime, be sure to refrigerate them until just before serving.

Bland or non-acid foods are especially susceptible to infection under warm, moist conditions. These foods include most cooked meat and poultry, many salads, including potato or bean, sandwich fillers, meringues, custards and cream desserts—pie, eclairs or cream puffs.

Food poisoning may not cause noticeable changes in the food, the home economists warn. In appearance, odor and taste, food appears normal. If in doubt about about a products that has been kept awhile, don't eat it, is their advice.

Refrigerate cooked foods immediately after the meal. If taking them to a picnic, pack them in an insulated bag or portable icebox. Be careful with picnic leftovers if they have not been refrigerated properly.
