

Nyssa's Son-in-Law Saves Woman's Life in California

Mrs. Emma Hall of Nyssa provided the Journal with a recent newspaper picture and clipping which told of the rescue of a Culver City, Calif., woman from her burning home by a neighbor, the Rev. Lloyd Pounds. The minister's wife is a daughter of Mrs. Hall.

The Pounds family was awakened about 12:30 a.m. by pleas from Ginger Baker, 13, daughter of Mrs. Helen Bernascone, 35, the rescued victim who had apparently fallen asleep on the living room couch with a lighted cigarette in her hand.

Her daughter had been awakened by the heat and thinking her mother had left the heater on, went into the living room to investigate. There she discovered the couch in flames and immediately ran to the Pounds home for help.

Mrs. Bernascone said the heat from the smoldering couch must have caused her to move into the bedroom, but she could not remember any of the incident and was still not fully conscious when taken to the Pounds' home.

Against protests of bystanders, the Rev. Pounds broke the bedroom window, entered the blazing, smoke-filled house and carried his neighbor to safety. His son, David, aided him in the rescue by carrying the woman from the window away from the fire area.

Mrs. Pounds, who was standing by, said much of the credit for the rescue should go to two unidentified men who trained a garden hose on the roof of the dwelling as her husband and son removed the victim.

The Culver City fire chief said that the Rev. Pounds would be cited by the department for his heroism and that he would recommend that the city council also cite the minister.

Both the Rev. Pounds and rescued woman were able to return to their jobs the following day.
