Additional Volumes Recently Added To Malheur Library

"Great Western Indian Fights" by members of the Potomac Corral of the Westerners. The decisive battles that lead to the opening of the American frontier.

"American Ferryboats" by John Perry. The story of the ferries and the ferrymen who transported passengers and goods, wagons and livestock, across American waterways in times of peace and in times of war and who created thereby a fascinating segment in the broad panorama of American life.

"Science Survey" edited by A. W. Haslett. An authoritative record, written for the general read-

er, of recent advances and developments in the scientific world.

"Things to Make for Children" by Sunset magazine. How-to-make-it ideas.

"The Fit" by William Wood. The story of an insecure orphaned boy, unable to cope with the pressures of life in a New England prep school, who finally has a nervous breakdown.

"Sail a Crooked Ship" by Nathaniel Benchley. A farce-comedy in which a young engaged couple is shanghaied by an extremely inefficient gang of bank robbers aboard a stolen merchant ship.

New books going into circulation Saturday, July 1, at Malheur county library include the following:

"In Place of Folly" by Norman Cousins. A compelling, deeply concerned book begins with a discussion of the realities of nuclear, chemical, biological and radiological warfare and shows what effect nuclear testing has already had on human life. Arguing that the current arms race can end only in mass destruction the author shows why and how a reorganized and strengthened U.N. could bring about and maintain peace.

"The Oregon Almanac and Book of Facts," edited by James E. Brooks. Basic, general information on Oregon's commerce, communication, government, industry, land, natural resources, people, recreation and transportation.

"Treat It Gentle" by Sidney Bechet. The life of a man who grew

up with jazz, from the early days of ragtime, through his work with one of Duke Ellington's first bands, to playing blues for royalty in England.

"Mary, Queen of Scots" by N. Brysson Morrison. The romantic tragedy of Mary, Queen of Scots, which has caught the imagination of the world for four centuries, works its old magic in this new biography.

"The Lower Animals" by Ralph Buchsbaum. Together, the text and pictures form an unsurpassed introduction to the life of land and water, the creatures of beach, drift, tidal pool and open sea, and the organisms in living tissue.

"Man and His Body" by Benjamin F. Miller. Written for the

layman, this account of human physiology describes the structure and working of each part of the body.

"The Manned Missile" by Ed Rees. An account of the manned missile bomber.

"Out on a Limerick," edited by Bennett Cerf. A collection of 300 limericks.

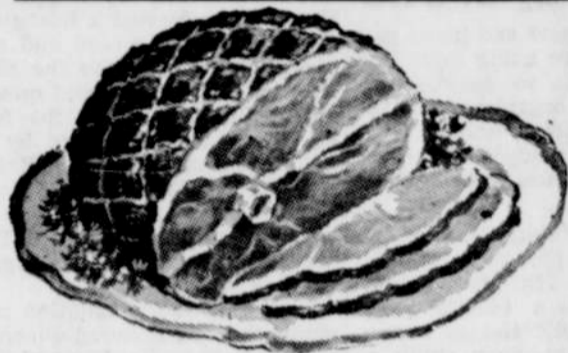
