Estimated Half of Capable Students Quit College, OSU Study Indicates

The fact that only about half of the brightest high school graduates go on to college has drawn wide comment and concern, but the tremendous and often needless drop out of capable college students before they get their degrees is equally tragic, says an Oregon State university leader.

More than half of the students who drop out of college are "just as capable academically as the ones who graduate," Dallas Norton, personnel coordinator and director of admissions for OSU, points out.

Norton and Richard F. Link, statistics professor, have made a study comparing college entrance exam scores, aptitude and proficiency tests, college grade performance and related measures of students who do—and don't graduate.

Their findings "do not support the concept that the non-graduate is inferior academically."
Except for the very weak student, factors other than preparation or aptitude apparently contribute to the eventual achievement of the bachelor's degree, they report in the national magazine, "Improving College and University Teaching," which is published by Oregon State.

OSU makes a brief "mortality" report on graduates of each class, Norton observed. It showed this spring that only 23 percent of the 2182 freshmen who entered Oregon State in September 1957 graduated four years later in June 1961.

These figures don't tell the whole story, of course, Norton emphasized. Another 10 to 12 percent of those 1957 freshmen will graduate next June, having taken five years (in pharmacy, forest engineering and some other programs five years are required).

About 10 percent of the 1957 freshmen who started at OSU either graduated this June from other institutions or will in the future, Norton continued. And another 5 percent will graduate either from OSU or elsewhere, anytime from 2 to 50 years from now.

But adding all of these together means that only half of the freshmen who started college in 1957 at OSU will ever get a degree.
"And more than half of those who don't certainly could have if they had continued their studies," Norton and Link are convinced from their studies of the records of the non-graduates.

The drop outs among the students achieving satisfactory college records result from many things, of course, Norton said. These include finances, family problems, marriage, lack of interest, immaturity and uncertain goals.

Some students are attracted or directed into "glamour fields" too rather than majors for which they are best adapted—and which they often really would prefer except for "parental pushing" and other factors. As a result, they do poorly and quit without trying or seeking counsel on other fields of work where they might succeed.

Loan and scholarship programs are being expanded by almost all institutions to help students overcome the obstacles of finances, but overcoming "lack of motivation and direction" is the difficult problem to solve, Norton observed.

Some 390,000 young men and women received college degrees this June in the U.S. but the 100,000 plus who could have, but didn't graduate, takes away some of the degree luster, Norton concluded.
