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## Farm Bureau Resolutions Conference Recommends Broad Farm Program

County Farm Bureau resolutions committee members from 32 Oregon counties held a two-day meeting in Redmond last month to propose study resolutions for membership policy-making this fall, according to Scott Lamb, information director. More than 100 people tackled subjects ranging from international affairs to education problems, through a series of subcommittee meetings designed to categorize the farm problems in question.

### Top subjects considered by the committees were listed as:

#### International Affairs

The group said the U.S. could not afford to tolerate domination of any countries in the western hemisphere by Russia or any other power. They urged strong and definite government action to uphold the Monroe Doctrine and to strengthen it against subversive action by foreign powers.

#### Taxation

The taxation committee referred study of a sales tax proposal as a means of broadening the tax base in Oregon to counties and further study and action at the policy-making meeting this fall. The sales tax proposal would make that form of taxation an offset for property and income taxes.

#### Education

The education committee opposed the Federal Aid to Education plan being considered by congress and pointed out that such plans would actually increase the cost of education through federal administrative costs involved. The group also felt that the three-year plan for federal aid was only a foot-in-the-door proposal which would increase through the years along with government controls.

#### Transportation

The committee approved the plan of the Santa Fe railroad to purchase Western Pacific railroad in the interests of keeping competition in rail transportation. They also recommended that counties make individual studies of the situation to see how it would affect them in their transportation facilities. Both Southern Pacific and Santa Fe have been bidding for rights to purchase Western Pacific railroad.

#### Public Affairs

Malheur County Farm Bureau submitted a resolution opposing the repeal of the law requiring all county courts to publish proceedings and expenditures of the courts. According to the Malheur organization, a group known as Oregon Associated Counties has asked that the law be repealed.

#### Natural Resources

The natural resources committee panned the Oregon legislature for not taking action on the Columbia river compact. Five western states have now ratified the compact which would give the states an advisory position in affairs of the Columbia river development projects. Oregon and Washington have not as yet taken action on participating in the compact.

In another important action of the natural resources committee, the group criticized Governor Hatfield's vetoing of the bill which would make state agencies' share in operation and maintenance charges equivalent to that which the lands would have paid

### had they remained in private ownership.

#### National Farm Program

The national farm program committee called for a bushel management program for wheat, which was a change from the recommendations of last year's program. The committee last year recommended that the price of wheat be tied to the support levels for corn. This year they have continued to recommend that feed grains be tied to corn but have taken wheat from the corn tie-in.

#### State Farm Program

The state farm program committee discussed the dairy situation and recommended a study be launched at once to provide information for dairymen on a method of settling the dairy price situation in the state of Oregon.

The group also agreed to recommend the labeling of AA grade eggs with a "Grown-in-Oregon" label.

#### The resolutions will now go out to the counties for membership study prior to policy-making at the county annual meetings in September.

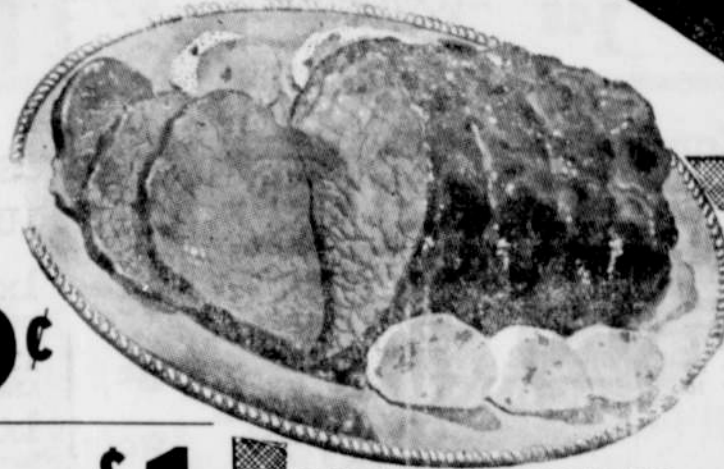

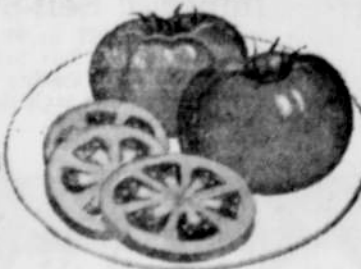
