

### Newly Elected Oregon Commander Gives Highlights of Legion Program

Newly elected Oregon Commander of the American Legion Charles R. Draper recently said that formation of an Anti-Subversive Activities committee under direction of the Legion Department Americanism commission "is a moral backstop to, and not a usurpation of functions of responsible government agencies."

Heralding the Supreme court's recent decision requiring the Communist party to register its membership, the Oregon Legion chief said, "This comes as a matter of satisfaction to Americans concerned for many years with the threat to free institutions posed by the Communist conspiracy."

"The opinion of the court is a justification for the extensive investigations by the Federal Bureau of Investigation and committees of congress over more than a decade and a half into the problem of internal security in the United States upon which the 1950 Subversive Activities Control act was based."

Draper is a much-decorated World War II veteran who saw service as a dive-bomber pilot with the U.S. Carrier Intrepid, receiving the Navy Cross, Silver Star and Distinguished Flying Cross with three stars.

Active in Legion affairs for several years, Draper was commander of Albany post No. 10 in 1950 and has since, year-by-year, climbed the Legion ladder through most offices and major assignments which led to his election to the highest office the largest veterans' organization can give in Oregon.

An Albany housing contractor and sand and gravel operator, Draper was elected to head the 35,000-member organization at the state convention of the Legion in Medford June 24.

ta Mae, is a past unit president of the American Legion auxiliary. They have four children: Jimmy, Timmy, Jenny and Cindy.

**To Revitalize Legion**  
"This year will see special emphasis for the Department of Oregon placed on inviting younger veterans to play a major role in this great service organization's activities which become more vital to our country's welfare in view of the fast-unfolding events of the day," Draper said.

"We, an organization of veterans of three wars, invite ex-servicemen to join our ranks."

"I believe the key to better citizenship is community service and pledge my tenure will see the Legion in the forefront in every community in Oregon. This means placing our shoulder more firmly behind our own vital programs and such worthy undertakings as the 'Heart Fund' drive and others," Draper continued.

The American Legion in Oregon gave more than \$100,000 to benevolent channels last year and places strong emphasis on child welfare programs. Nationally, the Legion spent \$8 million on child welfare last year.

"The American Legion is built around the ideal of the necessity to preserve the free institutions of America. This is our basic purpose. To the attainment of this fundamental objective, all American Legion programs and activities are shaped and attuned," Draper concluded.

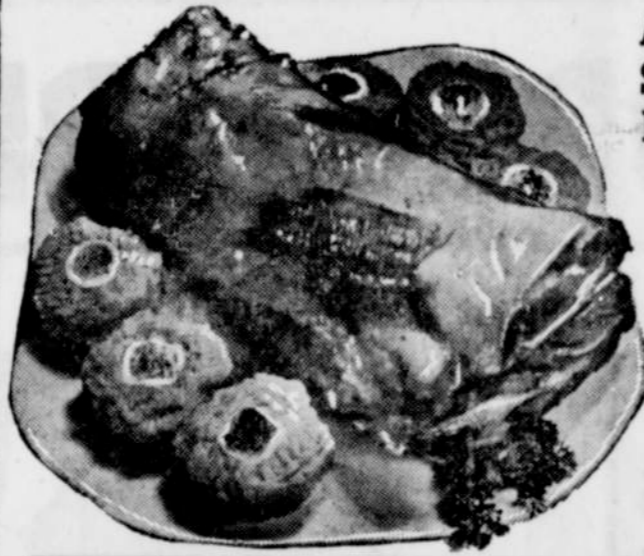
