

Many Interesting New Books Added Recently to Malheur County Library

"South America" by G. Paul Butler. This up-to-date, country-by-country guide to South America offers advice on what to see and do, where to eat and stay, and much other pertinent information for the tourist.

"Florida, A Way of Life" by Mary Ellen Smith. A persuasive invitation to visit or live in Florida, written by a native daughter. The well-publicized climate, resort areas, hunting, fishing and other attractions are given their due as the reader is taken on a tour of the state.

"Trailer Travel Here and Abroad" by Wally Byam. The American originator of a conducted trailer tours service describes Caravaner trips in the U. S., Mexico, Canada, Cuba, Europe and Africa. Chapters devoted to these expeditions and down-to-earth advice on trailer selection, driving and trips afford entertainment and information for the enthusiast and uninitiated.

"Elena" by Elena Zelayeta. A radiant autobiography of a woman blessed with an infectious zest for life and a faith even blindness could not destroy.

"Homestead on the Kootenai" by Jacoba Boothman Brad. The author's autobiography is an interesting picture of family life in a far corner of the Pacific Northwest in the early years of the century.

"A Zoo in My Luggage" by Gerald Durrell. The author tells of his recent trip to the British Cameroons, West Africa, to collect specimens for his own zoo.

"The Necklace of Kali" by Robert Towers. John Wickham, an American vice consul in Calcutta during the post-World War II years, is a narrator-protagonist of an absorbing novel that displays the author's familiarity with India and the Foreign Service.

"Home Is the Prisoner" by Jean Potts. Jim Singley returns from prison to Athena, a small town, after serving a six-year sentence for killing of his business partner. This story traces the effects of his return upon his best friend, the wife who hated him, his teenage son and the girl who helped save him from the death sentence.

"The Primal Yoke" by Tom Lea. A story about a Wyoming mountain guide who falls in love with a client's daughter and marries her despite the opposition of the client and of his own father.

"Wild Flowers of North America in Full Color" by Robert S. Lemmon. This memorial book contains 440 color plates of wild flowers from all sections of North America.

"The Golden Conquistadores" edited by Harry M. Rosen. The second book, presented in memory of Douglas Vern Neal by his uncle and aunt, Mr. and Mrs. Vern Neal of Placerville, Calif., contains accounts written by Spanish Conquistadores or by their friends which give vivid, firsthand views of the Central and North American adventures of Balboa, Cortes, DeSoto and others.

"An American Dialogue" by Robert McAfee Brown and Gustave Weigel. A book selected as one of the Notable Books of 1960 that presents a Protestant look at

Catholicism and a Catholic look at Protestantism.

"Interplanetary Flight" by Arthur C. Clarke. An introduction to astronautics.

"A Guide to the Stars" by Patrick Moore. A lucid, reliable and highly readable account of man's present knowledge of the stars.

"Dempsey" by Jack Dempsey. An autobiography of Dempsey, ex-heavyweight champion of the world, written in first person in snatches about fights, broken marriages, lawsuits, bitter early experiences, and prosperous and happier later years.

"My Kingdom for a Horse" edited by Fairfax Downey. A collection of the greatest horse stories of all times.

"The Problem Horse" by Reginald Summerhays. An expert's tested guide for curing the most common, as well as more serious, behavior faults in the horse.

"How to Tailor" by Phyllis W. Schwabke. Handbook of tailoring skills to be used by the dressmaker at home or in adult education classes.

"Goren's Hoyle Encyclopedia of Games" by Charles Goren. More than 500 games are described and their winning techniques analyzed.

"The Many Colored Coat" by Morley Callaghan. Set in present day Montreal, this unusual and compelling novel portrays the decisive consequences of a friendship between a bank manager and a public relations man. A subtle, intrinsically dramatic work in which personalities and moral issues are searchingly explored.

"Madame Goldenflower" by Chin-yang Li. A lively and well-written historical romance set in China at the time of the Boxer rebellion.

"Radius of Action" by DeWitt Copp. A plot built around the reactions of five passengers, one of them a young woman, who are forced to stay in an isolated area of the Pacific Northwest for several months after their plane crashes.

"Pilgrim Circuit Rider" by Leila W. Anderson. The inspiring story of a woman missionary whose parish spreads across rural America.

"The Navajos" by Ruth M. Underhill. An authoritative account of the Navajos, from the time of their myth-shrouded appearance in the southwest to their present-day position.

"Africa Is Adventure" by Attilio Gatti. An account of the author's experiences on a safari to the Serengeti Plains in Tanganyika, Africa, to photograph wild animals.

"Water Color Painting Is Fun" by Alois Fabry. The author, in simple language and helpful illustrations, tells the best materials to use and explains different techniques.

"Cavalcade of the North" edited by George E. Nelson. An entertaining collection of distinguished writing by Canadian authors.

"Before You Go" by Jerome Weidman. A strange, intermittently interesting novel has as pivotal characters the verbose, ambitious Ben Ivey and two sisters, Julie and Celia Sarno, whose
