

Rev. G. J. Kuiper Becomes Minister At Presbyterian Church in Adrian

This month saw the coming to Adrian of the Rev. and Mrs. G. J. Kuiper. Mr. Kuiper will be the third minister of the Community United Presbyterian church, Kingman Memorial, succeeding the Rev. Henry E. Moore, who retired Jan. 1 of this year.

Mr. and Mrs. Kuiper recently returned from the United Kingdom, where they were married May 6 at Royal Church of St. Anne in Kew, Surrey, home church of Mrs. Kuiper, a native of London. Mr. Kuiper had just finished his research studies in New Testament at the theological college of St. Andrews university, located in St. Andrews, Scotland.

At the congregational meeting of the Community United Presbyterian church Sunday morning, June 25, the congregation voted unanimously to call Mr. Kuiper to be its minister, which call Mr. Kuiper accepted that morning.

Boise Presbytery Approves Call
The Presbytery of Boise, the body of ministers and elders charged with the oversight of the denomination's churches in this area, approved this call at its July 9 meeting in Caldwell. Sunday evening, Aug. 13, at 8 o'clock has been set as the service of installation by the Presbytery of Boise at the church.

Mr. Kuiper lived with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. G. Kuiper in Caldwell, Idaho, who moved there in 1950 from Amsterdam, The Netherlands. Born there in 1933, the Rev. G. J. Kuiper received his primary and secondary education in Amsterdam.

He attended College of Idaho, receiving the bachelor of arts degree in 1954 and the San Francisco Theological seminary in San Anselmo, Calif., receiving his bachelor of divinity degree cum laude in 1957. After ordination in 1957 Mr. Kuiper served as stated-supply pastor at the First Presbyterian church in Emmett, Idaho, and then returned to the seminary in San Anselmo to give instruction in New Testament Greek and Syriac as a teaching fellow and to work on his master's degree in the science of theology.

Degree Conferred Cum Laude
This degree was conferred upon him in 1958 cum laude, partially on the dissertation on first-century Palestinian Aramaic, the language of Jesus. In 1958 Mr. Kuiper went to St. Mary's college of the University of St. Andrews as a post graduate research fellow of the United Presbyterian church in the U.S.A., to write his doctor's dissertation on this same subject under the Very Rev. Professor Matthew Black, FBA, outstanding New Testament scholar and foremost authority of the Aramaic language.

Mr. Kuiper has completed this dissertation and will receive his doctor of philosophy degree at the next graduation, in the autumn of this year. While in Europe, he also studied at the "Carl Ruprecht" university of Heidelberg, Germany, and worked at the Bodleian library in Oxford

under the supervision of the Rev. Professor P. E. Kahle, FBA.

Mrs. Kuiper Studies in London
Mrs. G. J. Kuiper left the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. M. Baxter in London, May 20, 1961, to come to this country with her husband. After receiving her primary and secondary education in London, she trained for dental nursing at Eastman Dental hospital in London and afterwards worked as a registered dental nurse at London's West Middlesex hospital.

She also worked as a member of the Lee Abbey community in Lynton, North Devonshire. For six months prior to her marriage Mrs. Kuiper lived in Noorwijk-aan-Zee, The Netherlands, to learn the Netherlands' language, while working as nurse at the rheumatism clinic there.

While settling in their new home, which has been recently redecorated by members of the church, Mr. and Mrs. Kuiper have already experienced the friendliness of the people in Adrian and together look forward to many good years there.

Pre-Registration Information Given By BJC Registrar

Information regarding the new pre-registration system that is being inaugurated at Boise Junior college this year is now being sent to students who are cleared to register, it has been announced by Alice H. Hatton, registrar. "New students are being sent permits to register," said Mrs. Hatton, "along with a form that they may complete and return to schedule an appointment with a counselor to pre-register. This will also apply to returning students."

As announced by the registrar's office, remaining dates for prospective student appointments are Aug. 1, 3, 8, 10, 15, 17, 22, 24, 29 and 31; and Sept. 5 and 7. Students will have the opportunity to select a first, second and third choice of a date for the appointment.

Mrs. Hatton said, "If students elect to register during the summer, they should be prepared to have sufficient funds with them to pay tuition and fees. Books will also be available in the book store."

It was further pointed out by Mrs. Hatton that if students register during the summer and subsequently find that they are unable to attend the fall semester, all tuition and fees paid with the exception of the \$5 registration fee will be refunded providing they officially withdraw before Sept. 11. After that date the refund schedule as listed in the catalog will be in effect.

In closing she said, if students plan to pre-register they should report to room 113, administration building, and be sure to bring their permit to register.

41% of OSU Men, 12% of Females Self-Supporting

Forty-one percent of the men students and 12 percent of the coeds enrolled at Oregon State university last year were 100 percent self-supporting, a survey made by the registrar's office reveals.

Seventy-five percent of all men students were at least 50 percent self-supporting and 30 percent of the women students said they earned at least half of their own school expenses.

The totals are slightly above the figures reported in the survey in past years.

Only 8 percent of the men and 33 percent of the women said they were totally dependent on their families.

Summer job savings, part-time work during school and careful management of funds during the year make it possible for any stu-

dent to go to college "if he or she wants to badly enough and can handle college work," OSU officials noted.

Students earned a record \$146,255 last year at jobs found through the university employment service, it was reported. All told, some 2120 men students and 524 women students and student wives found part-time work through the office. The student loan fund office also provided financial help for many students.

Evidence that working doesn't cut achievement in college unduly is shown in figures compiled by Registrar D. T. Ordeman on students nominated for all-school honors and awards. Coeds nominated averaged at least 50 percent self-supporting and men, 70 percent self-supporting.

Liquor Sales, Tax Funds Distributed

Oregon liquor control commission reports that distribution of revenue from liquor sales and privilege tax collections for the three-month period ending June 30 amounted to \$3,075,069.

According to George Van Bergen, administrator, a total of \$17,924,412, obtained from state liquor sales, license fees and privilege tax receipts, was distributed during the 1960-61 fiscal year. Of this amount, the state general fund received \$14,694,227, while incorporated cities and county treasuries received \$3,217,113. \$13,072 was earmarked for the state census fund.

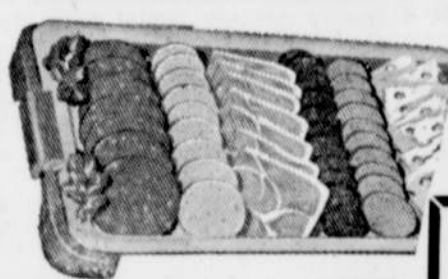
