

Mint Growers Gain Hearing on Plan To Establish County Control Area

A hearing will be held in the county courthouse in Vale Tuesday, Sept. 12, at 7:30 p.m. on a proposal to make Malheur county a mint control area.

This announcement comes from Hugh Taylor, plant division chief of the state department of agriculture at Salem. The department has called the hearing as result of a petition from mint growers of Malheur county.

Copies of the proposed control area order may be obtained from the department at Salem, the Malheur shipping point inspection office or the county agent's office at Ontario.

Under the proposals now before the department—and subject to

outcome of the hearing—a control area would tighten handling of mint stock to protect the local production against mint wilt and other disease organisms.

Major provisions which the order, if adopted, would include:

Only certified mint roots could enter Malheur county.

Prohibit entry of contaminated machinery used in mint harvests or handling in other sections of the state or other states.

Designate areas at which mint could be loaded.

Require annual inspection of mint fields. This would require each mint grower to notify the department or a designated local inspector of all mint fields under his ownership, control or supervision before July 15 each year.

Prohibit the importation of geese to weed mint unless a clearance certificate is granted by the state or county inspector.

Growers would be required to eradicate or control any disease causing wilt.

Upland Game Bird Hunting Outlook Appears Bright

Good shooting for pheasants, fair gunning for grouse and top hunting for quail and chukar partridge appear to be the prospects for upland bird hunters this fall, according to upland game bird brood counts recently completed.

Bob Mace, who heads the game commission's upland game bird program, reports the production of Oregon's number one game bird, the ringnecked pheasant, to be spotty with excellent populations in some areas and only fair numbers in others.

West of the Cascades, the Willamette valley appears good with the trend showing brood counts on a par with the high count of last year. The population in south of last year. The population in southwestern Oregon is down somewhat but hunters should find fair shooting in the Rogue valley.

Central Oregon populations are on a par with last year, but in the Klamath area counts are low and hunters will find only fair gunning throughout the basin. Populations appear to be stable in the fringe valleys of southeastern Oregon.

Best prospects for ringnecks are expected to be in the northeastern wheat belt in Umatilla and Morrow counties, with Union county running a close second. Pheasant hunting in Malheur county should compare with last year.

Chukar brood counts are up in all eastern Oregon areas and hunters should find excellent gunning for this red-legged partridge this fall. Mountain quail also show a rise in population throughout the state, and valley quail are plentiful, particularly in the southeastern section of the state.

Blue and ruffed grouse are widely scattered as they were last year with the best prospects in the coast range and the Blue mountains to the east. Sage grouse numbers vary from a year ago with the best populations in Malheur county.

Livestock Loans Offered Farmers

Special livestock loans are available to eligible livestock producers through Dec. 31, 1961, according to Robert V. Pierce, Oregon state director of the Farmers Home administration.

Loans are made to established producers and feeders of cattle and sheep (except commercial feedlot operators) who are temporarily unable to get from regular sources the credit needed to continue their normal operations.

To be eligible an applicant must have a good past record of livestock operations and have reasonable prospects for success with the help of the loan.

Loans are made to meet the usual expenses of livestock operations such as the production or purchase of feed and replacing or repairing of farm machinery. Farmers may also apply for loans to restock their herds or flocks to normal size if they can carry on their livestock operations without having to buy substantial amounts of feed. Loans are not made to refinance existing debts except current incidental bills.

If a farmer already has his livestock mortgaged, the other creditors will not be asked to subordinate their liens. However, they will be expected to stand by and to agree that a reasonable part of the applicant's normal income from the livestock can be used in repaying the loan.

These special loans bear 5 percent interest and are scheduled for repayment over periods up to three years.

Farmers may apply at the local county office of the Farmers Home administration, 153½ S.W. First street, Ontario. Supervisors are in the office on Mondays.
