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tory, the exterior of the new storage silo is almost done, and the new dryer will be completed prior to Sept. 25.

Addition to the building to house the new diffuser has added about 9,400 square feet of floor space, over three floors, to the existing plant. Painting, connecting and testing remain to be done.

The new silo is about complete on the exterior with painting yet to be done. Workmen are now putting in an electrical conveying system and augurs to move bulk sugar from the factory to the silo and from the silo to railroad bulk cars. It will hold 40 million pounds or 400 thousand 100-pound bags of sugar when completed in November or December. Plant operations are not dependent upon the silo at starting time.

A new dryer is also being installed under supervision of two German engineers. The dryer was manufactured by Buttner Works, Inc., of Krefeld, West Germany. It was shipped by boat to Portland and by rail on to Nyssa.

Business College Starts Sept. 11

Harold Ludwig, owner of Ludwig Commercial college, Ontario, announces that the fall term of the school will start Monday, Sept. 11. Evening courses are being improved this year so that it will be possible to get a diploma by attending evening school, as well as day school.

The school will concentrate on training secretaries, general office workers and bookkeepers, Ludwig said. Speedwriting and Gregg shorthand will both be offered. The school will train students for either civil service jobs or positions in private business and industry.

Since the school has been in operation, which has now been about 2½ years, 53 students have found employment because of the training they have received. This is about one every two weeks that the school has been in operation, Ludwig pointed out. In order for the student to receive a favorable recommendation, he must have met all requirement of the school. This will take from 6 to 12 months depending upon previous experience and training.
