

## Truck Permit Revoked For Failure to Report

Public Utility Commissioner Joel C. Hill Friday revoked a common carrier permit held by Kenneth F. Mace, Nyssa owner of the Snake River Valley Truck Line, for failing to exercise his operating rights for a period of more than six months.

Hill said Mace's permit had been suspended since June, 1960, for failure to file mileage reports required by Oregon law.

The truck line had been authorized to operate within, from and to 50 road miles of Adrian in Malheur county.

## Real Estate Classes Slated for Sept. 6

## Oregon Official Reveals Changes In School Bus Law

Last year in Oregon 2400 school buses traveled over 18 million miles on Oregon highways, daily transporting 185,000 children to and from school, according to Leon P. Minear, state superintendent of public instruction.

The 1961 Oregon legislature made four major law changes for this major transporting agency which will directly affect over one million Oregon motorists and school children.

A. Harvey Wright, director of the transportation section of the state department of education, summarizes the new Oregon revised statutes in the following manner:

1. Vehicles meeting or overtaking a school bus on a two or three lane highway must stop when the flashing red warning lights are in operation on the bus. Traffic must remain stopped so long as the flashing red warning lights are in operation.

On highways with two or more lanes in each direction, vehicles overtaking a school bus must stop when red warning lights are flashing.

Vehicles meeting a school bus need not stop when red warning lights are flashing.

2. School buses may cross railroad crossings without stopping at any time that the normal flow of traffic does not have to stop, namely when a regular traffic light is in operation and it is green, when an authorized person is directing traffic, or when an abandoned railroad crossing has been so marked by the public utilities commission.

3. School buses may now travel on the open highway at a speed of 55 miles an hour.

4. A school bus is defined by law as a vehicle of 12 passenger capacity or over which transports children to and from school.

## Conservation Loans Available From FHA

Special loan funds are available to eligible operators of irrigated lands for concrete ditches, wells, sumps, pumping equipment, permanent reseeded and any other soil and water conservation practices where the reed stems from the drought, according to Robert V. Pierce, state director of Farmers Home administration.

Loans are available for non-irrigated land only for stock water wells, which are required for preservation of livestock.

These special emergency loans are made to those eligible farmers or ranchers who are unable to secure credit from other responsible credit sources on reasonable repayment terms.

Loans may be secured by second real estate mortgages and may be for periods up to 20 years. Authority to make such loans expires on July 30, 1962.
