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Health Board Urges
New Immunizations
For Varied Diseases

Oregon State Board of Health this week re-emphasized the need for Oregon citizens to do something about the low immunization levels.

"Too many Oregonians are depending on immunizations received too many years ago," says Carl Holm, M.D., president of Oregon State Board of Health. Immunizations lose their effectiveness, much the same as the battery in a car, and need to be boosted periodically.

In years past, individuals, especially adults, were more frequently exposed to various diseases and this acted as a means of boosting their immunity level. Today, diseases, such as diphtheria, smallpox and polio, are less frequent and there is less opportunity to maintain a safe immunity level unless individuals get immunized.

An immunization record card has been developed by the state board and is being made available to all Oregon residents through their physician or local public health department.

"The reverse side of the card provides space to record all immunizations in addition to other information. It folds and fits easily into a wallet or purse. The card should be carried at all times because it provides information which the attending physician needs in case you are injured or ill," Dr. Holm emphasized.

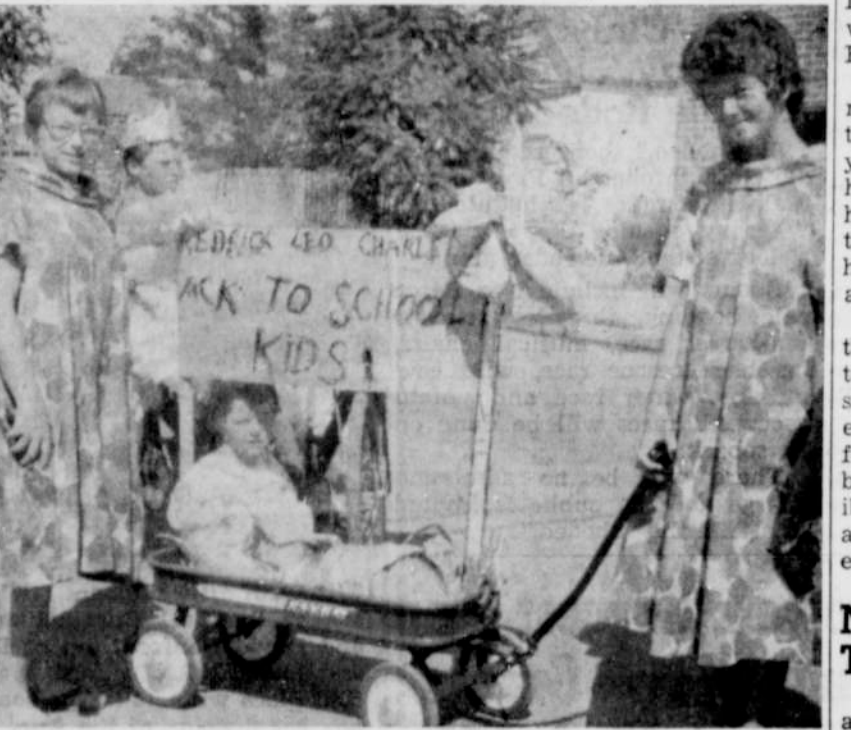

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Oregon Legislators
Seek Federal Funds
For Range Reforestation

Democratic members of Oregon's Congressional delegation—Senators Wayne Morse and Maurice Neuberger and Congressman Al Ullman—took action last week to seek emergency funds to reseed public range lands which have suffered unusually heavy fire losses this year.

A joint letter from the trio to Interior Secretary Udall called on him to submit a request for needed funds to congress in time for action before adjournment. The three lawmakers followed this with a conference with bureau of the budget officials designed to further clear the way for rapid action on the problem.

The letter to Udall pointed out that fire damage to range lands this year has been even more severe than last year, when a special supplemental appropriation measure was also required. Morse, Neuberger and Ullman cited figures provided by the Oregon Cattlemen's association which reported 15,000 acres of public range land in need of reseeding as well as extensive damage to other bureau of land management acreage and private and state lands.

The Oregon Democrats announced that discussion with the department of the interior indicated a need for about \$1.3 million in emergency funds for federal lands in the western states of which a major part would be for BLM work in Oregon.

The joint Morse-Neuberger-Ullman letter pointed out that reductions of grazing use in recent years have "worked extreme hardships on the livestock permit-holders" and said that "The extreme fires of the last two years have created a more critical situation."

Following their discussion of the problem with the bureau of the budget, the three Oregonians said that assurance had been given that a request for supplemental funds from Secretary Udall would be processed as rapidly as possible by the bureau of the budget and submitted to congress at an early date.
