One-Car Accident Sun. Claims Life Of Young Nyssan

Funeral services for Carolyn Frimko Nakashima will be conducted at 2 o'clock Saturday, Sept. 16, at Nyssa Methodist church. The Rev. Paul Ludlow will officiate and will be assisted by the Rev. George Ueyemura of Ontario Community Methodist church.

Arrangements are under direction of Lienkaemper funeral home.

Miss Nakashima succumbed shortly before midnight Sunday in a one-car mishap on highway 99 south of Salem. Oregon state police said her car left the freeway and struck an oak tree. She was alone in the automobile and the cause of her losing control of the car is unknown.

She had been to Hood River to visit her grandparents and an uncle and was returning to Corvallis when the accident occurred. Miss Nakashima was pronounced dead on arrival at Albany General hospital.

Carolyn, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Nakashima of 415 North First street, Nyssa, would have been 21 years old at the end of this month.

She was graduated with the class of 1957 from Nyssa high school and was an outstanding science student. She would have been a senior this fall at Oregon State university in Corvallis where she was studying pharmacy.

In addition to her parents, she is survived by two brothers, Harry, Jr. (Skipper) who is stationed at the Marine Recruit Training depot in San Diego, Calif., and Roger of the home.

Other survivors are maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. C. K. Iwatsuki of Hood River.

Harry, Jr. was summoned home from San Diego due to his sister's death and arrived Tuesday evening in Boise by plane.

Plea for Vale, Huntington Road Vetoed by Court

In county court Sept. 6 former County Judge G. Y. Chester, Charles Swan and Kenneth Kessler, president of Vale Chamber of Commerce, presented a plea for a survey and eventual construction of a new road from Farewell Bend near Huntington into Vale.

The court said it was not opposed to construction of the road but that it did not qualify as a farm-to-market road and that welfare labor could not be used on it since it would be classed as new construction.

The court further stated that it was committed to working for the Succor creek road as an Oregon secondary road and to the construction of farm-to-market roads in the Ridgeview and Annex communities before considering any other projects.

It was pointed out by the court that roads should be considered first on a basis of usage and second on need and that the road proposed by the Vale group did not fall in this class but would have to be considered as a recreational road.

The Succor creek road would shorten the distance south to Jordan Valley and eliminate the long climb now being used on highway 95 on the Idaho side, the court felt, and would serve many farmers, ranchers and tourists.

County Farm Bureau Elects New Board, J. Tucke President

John Tucke, route 2, Vale, has been elected to serve as president of the Malheur County Farm Bureau for the coming year.

Tucke has a diversified farm near Willowcreek. He has served as vice president of the county Farm Bureau for the last two years and succeeds Mamoru Wakasugi, who has served as president for two years. Wakasugi is a farmer in the Annex area and will be the regional director from Malheur county. He will also serve on the board of directors of Oregon Farm Bureau.

Also elected by the membership to serve as vice president was Marvin Ogilvie, who farms at Ontario and has a ranch at Ironside. Keith Lane of Nyssa will serve as voting delegate and Norbert Sarazin, Nyssa, was elected as his alternate.

The Farm Bureau is now preparing testimony to be presented at the congressional hearing tentatively scheduled for Sept. 28-29 in Ontario relative to the use of public lands. Jack Dentel, Jordan Valley, will be spokesman for the Farm Bureau.
