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## Nampa Services Held Tuesday Afternoon For Mrs. Fina Miller

Funeral services for Mrs. Fina Elizabeth Miller, 63, were conducted at 2 o'clock Sept. 12, 1961, at the Alisp chapel in Nampa with the Rev. Leo Reed officiating. Mrs. Miller succumbed Sept. 9 in a Nampa hospital following a brief illness.

She was born Nov. 11, 1897, in Johnson county, Tenn., and moved with her parents to the Apple Valley community in 1916. She was united in marriage Jan. 1, 1918, to George C. Miller in Parma. They homesteaded in the Melba area in 1920-21 and returned later to Apple Valley. The family moved to Nampa in 1928, moved back to Melba where they resided until 1954 when they returned to Nampa to make their home.

Mrs. Miller was a member of State Board of Practical Nurses and was a past president of that group. She was a member of the vocational education group and served for two years as migrant worker nurse for the Southern Idaho Council of Churches. She was a member of the First Baptist church in Nampa and was a deaconess in that institution. She was also state love-gift chairman for the Baptist church Women's Missionary society.

In addition to Mr. Miller of the home, survivors include a son, John W. Miller of Melba; one sister, Edna Dutro of Nampa; two brothers, Sherman and Conley Wilson of Parma, and five grandchildren.

Interment was made in the Parma cemetery.

## Writer Highly Praises Congressman Ullman

To the Editor

Nyssa Gate City Journal:

When I was a child my mother taught us to say "thank you" and spanked us if we didn't. I still think it's no more than right to thank those who have visited goodness and kindness upon us.

Don't we all? Let us see! Albert Ullman, our U.S. congressman, fathered the bill to abolish futures trading in onions. Gamblers manipulated the market so that in March one year onions were worth 10 cents a bag, here, not in Chicago, and the bags themselves cost 20 cents. Was that stealing or was it stealing? Gamblers were worse than onion maggots. Now, I see many fine fields of onions here. Thank you, Mr. Ullman!

## Fights Large Farm Corporations

When the San Luis government project in Central California was authorized, millionaire corporation farmers tried to hog the land by knocking out the family farm 160-acre limit. Do people in California need corporation farms, when thousands of young men there can't get a home in the country? Do we need them anywhere? Our boy Ullman went to bat and saved the 160-acre limit.

Al Ullman was one of four congressmen who had the "guts" to testify before the high and mighty Senate Interstate Commerce committee, that Jerome Kuykendall was no more fit to be a federal power commissioner than a coyote is to protect chickens. Kuykendall was a friend of oil, gas and power potentates, not of the people they rob. Six to eight years ago we badly needed Howard Morgan.

Military man Eisenhower set his jaw against any new starts of dams for cheap power that we need so badly in this country. So, we got three minor dams at Hells Canyon, instead of another Grand Coulee.

## Works for Other Projects

Yet, in this discouraging situation, Ullman worked for Bully creek, for Baker valley, for Crooked creek and the Dalles Western—for public dams everywhere—they pay for themselves. Some giant utilities who ruthlessly engineer their private fortunes out of God-given resources that belong to all of us, don't like Ullman.

He fought against high interest rates that largely caused the third Eisenhower hard times. It took about \$11 billion out of our pockets and put it into the pockets of money lenders. You couldn't buy a pair of shoes without paying some of that high interest.

When interest doubled, pay checks went up 40 percent, farm income dipped 27 percent and farm mortgages were upped 60 percent. On Aug. 8 last year Mr. Ullman told an Ontario audience, "There is no surer way of taking money out of the pockets of the many and concentrating it in the hands of the few . . . One of the things Eastern Oregon needs worst is a properly regulated money market."

## Ullman Attends to Business

Al Ullman was Johnny-on-the-spot at 96 percent of the roll calls, attending to business. He battled for Alaskan statehood, extension of the wool control act, the John Day dam, community colleges, the right kind of aid to Latin America. I have no idea how many bills he voted against that we could do without.

Yet, how many of us thanked him for this fine record? Exactly 4505, the election returns say. Actually, 3854 Malheur county citizens voted for a pussy little fellow who flew to Washington, D.C., had his picture taken with tricky

## Military Rites Held At Nyssa Cemetery For Elmer Cloninger

Services for Elmer E. Cloninger were conducted at 3:30 o'clock Sept. 12, 1961, at Lienkaemper chapel with the Rev. Armand Larive of St. Paul's Episcopal church officiating.

He succumbed Sept. 8, 1961, when he suffered a heart attack while he and Mrs. Cloninger were visiting her brothers in Coeur d'Alene, Idaho.

Mr. Cloninger was born May 14, 1886, in Scappoose, Ore., a son of David and Bessie Cloninger. He was married June 22, 1916, in California to Alma Hinemoa Crozier. She succumbed Dec. 3, 1959.

The Cloningers came to Nyssa in 1935 when he was in charge of the triple C camp. Early in 1936, they homesteaded the present farm near Nyssa.

Mr. Cloninger was a World War I veteran, a member of the Episcopal church, Nyssa Eagles aerie, Veterans of Foreign Wars and American Legion post 79. He was active in Izaak Walton league and according to friends, was dedicated to helping the youth of the community. His favorite hobbies were hunting and fishing.

He was united in marriage to Ruth Allen on March 24, 1961, in Parma, Idaho.

In addition to his widow, Ruth of the home, survivors include his mother, Mrs. Bessie Cloninger of Nyssa; one son, Paul of Seattle; a daughter, Mrs. Hinemoa Ruskin of Chicago; one brother, Oliver of Portland, and six grandchildren.

Military graveside services were conducted by American Legion post 79 with Past Department Commander Fred E. Bennett in charge.
