Mrs. Walt DeBleick of Boise spent from Wednesday until Sunday visiting in the Dwight Smith home.



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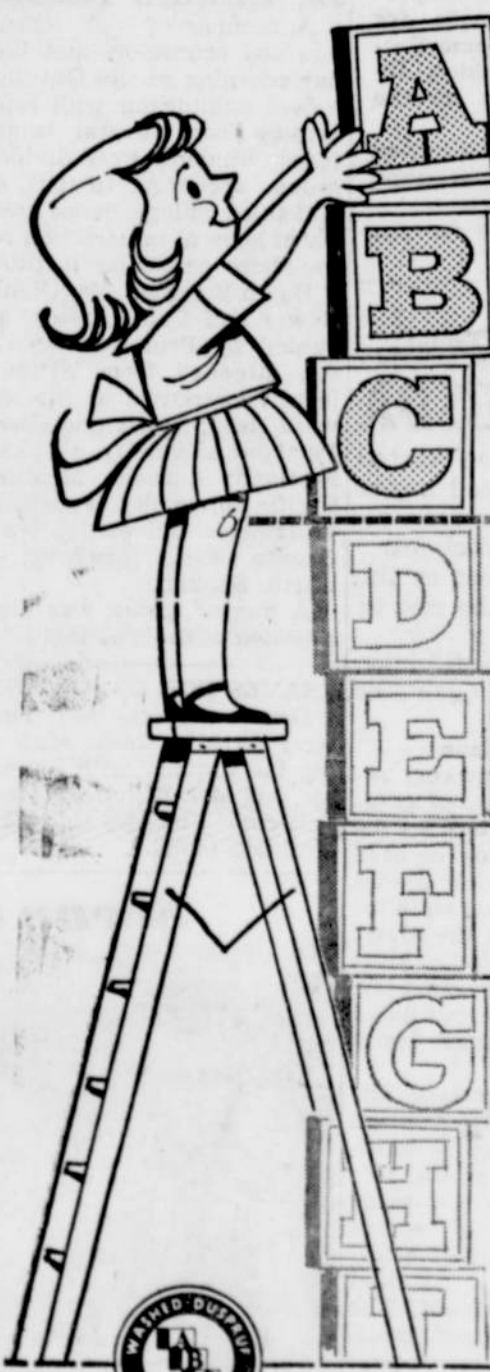
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
