At the Library . . .

"Television in the Lives of Our Children" by Wilbur Schramm. After making a study of over 6,000 children, the author discusses the effects of television on their lives.

"Teach With Television" by Lawrence Costello. A manual on how to produce and use television to teach in a formal manner on any level of schooling.

"The Crisis in American Medicine" edited by Marion K. Sanders. Eleven articles, each by an eminent doctor or expert in an allied field, explore various facets of the dissatisfaction of many Americans with the medical care they are receiving when they nevertheless believe American medicine is now the best in the world.

"The Gentle Legions" by Richard Carter. A study of national voluntary health organizations.

"The Empty Robe" by Stella Crater. The wife of a New York State Supreme Court justice who disappeared in August 1930 and has never been found writes, with a co-author's help, of her happy married life and of the events following and theories about Judge Crater's disappearance.

"You Can Trust the Communists" by Fred Schwarz. Taking his title from the statement that "You can trust the Communists to act in accordance with the laws of their being," the author writes of the aims of the Communist party and how these are accomplished.

"Seven Men at Daybreak" by Alan Burgess. The story of the men who parachuted into Czechoslovakia to kill S.S. General Heydrich.

"Western Ghost Towns" by Lambert Florin. Over 200 photographs illustrate this book which tells of ghost towns in Oregon, Idaho, Washington, Nevada, California and Colorado.

"Cars at Speed" by Robert Daley. The author takes the reader to each of the 13 Grand Prix circuits and gives the history of each course and tells of the men who manufacture and design the cars, and those who drive them.

Future meetings will be held the second Monday of each month. Next meeting will be Nov. 13 at the home of Mrs. Don Lytle.

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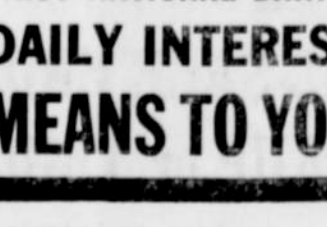
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
