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Sunday Chapel Rites Conducted in Nyssa For Lee Householder

Funeral services for Henry Lee Householder were conducted at 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon, Oct. 8, 1961, at Lienkaemper chapel with the Rev. Henry Moore of Adrian officiating.

Mr. Householder succumbed Thursday, Oct. 5, 1961, at Malheur Memorial hospital following an extended illness.

He was born Nov. 30, 1879, at Dodge City, Kan., a son of Oliver and Lydia Householder.

At the age of 17 years, he and a friend, John Seitz, rode bicycles from McCune, Kan., to Nampa, Idaho. Enroute the boys stopped at Boulder, Colo., where they worked for a while on a cattle ranch. Upon arrival in Nampa, Mr. Householder went to work helping to build the Dewey Palace hotel.

From Nampa he went to Boise where he was employed in the stock industry and later went to Weiser, Idaho, where he worked at the Weiser hotel.

He then went to McCall, Idaho, as a stockman. He raised sheep, did general farming and some mining. He spent much time in the primitive area of Idaho and did a lot of skiing.

His many stories of olden days included one when he used to pack supplies and mail by horse-drawn sled from McCall to Thunder mountain, Edwardsburg and Burgdorf. Many times the horses were fitted with snow shoes when the snow was piled high. The pioneer resident also worked at the store and post office at Yellow-pine.

He was united in marriage Sept. 30, 1918, to Emma Schweizer in Weiser. They moved to the present farm on route 1, Nyssa, in 1943 which was homesteaded in 1883 by Mrs. Householder's parents, Otto and Margaret Schweizer.

Mr. Householder was a member of Odd Fellows lodge of Caldwell and Woodmen of America at New Plymouth.

Survivors include his widow of the home and one brother, Stanford of Pittsburg, Kan. His parents and one brother, Oscar, preceded him in death.

Interment was made in Owyhee cemetery under direction of Lienkaemper funeral home.
