decency of youth today but emphasized the concern necessary to meet the problems of juvenile delinquency.

Delinquency Problems Discussed
The county judge stated that six percent of the youth of the county had been in court, said that three percent were considered to be on the danger point on the national level. Juvenile delinquency is not a new problem, but the question is, "Have adults really done better?" The judge listed as the major fault of parents, the failure to give understanding.

During the question period, directed by Chief Love, many attending the Thursday evening meeting asked specific questions about the youth center plan.

When the question arose concerning the advisability of putting a youth who had committed offenses into a normal home, Judge White presented an illustration. He told of a youth who went into a foster home where three children already resided together with the parents. The youth had a good influence with a five to one ratio. His chances for rehabilitation would be good as the ratio would be the same if he tried to wrongly influence the family. Another question discussed was the part the school and community plays in meeting problems of Nyssa youth.

Lesson topic will be "Home-made Toys." All interested ladies are invited to attend.

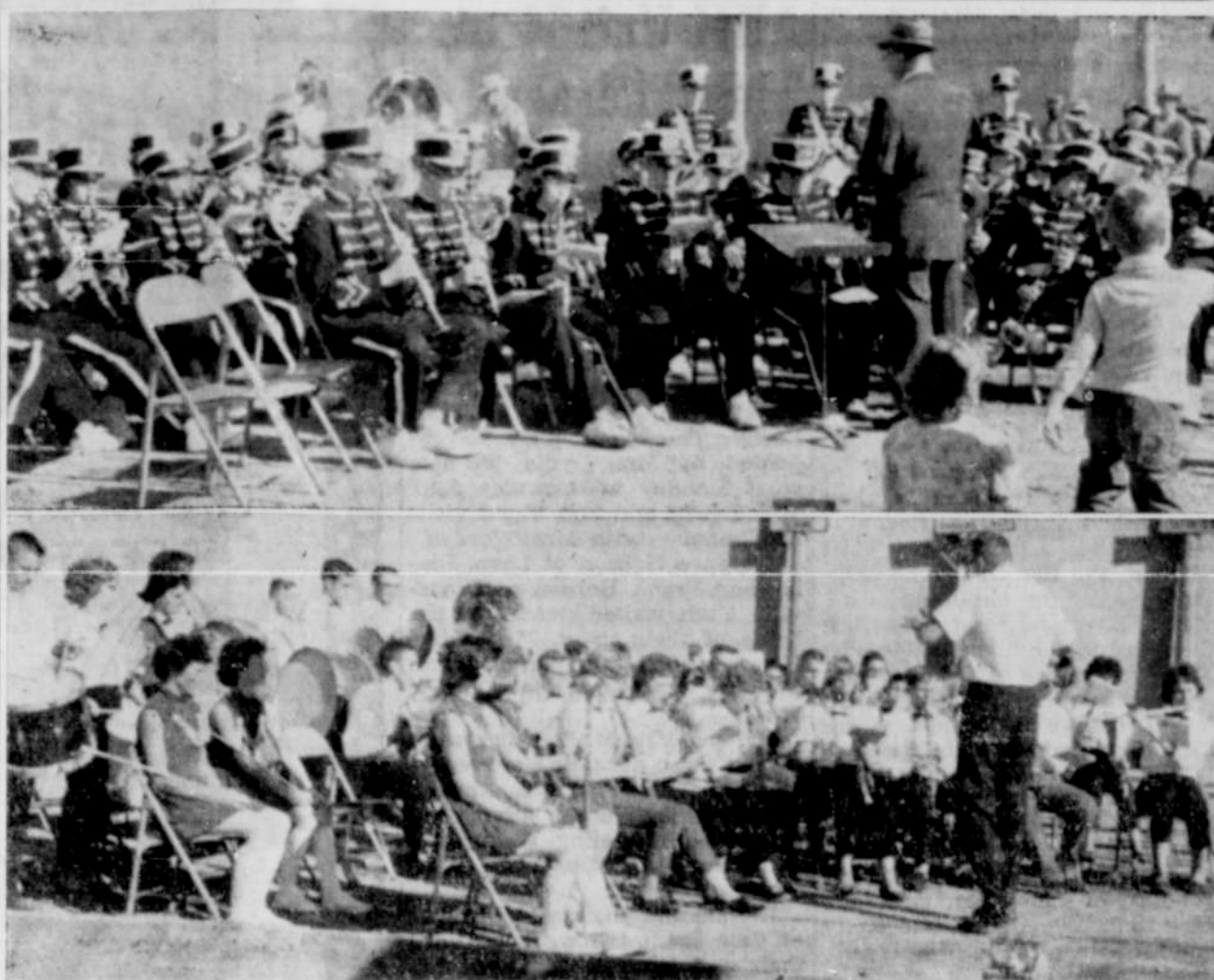
